

FATHER LIAM SAYS: Priests and deacons of the various parishes in each Deanery meet on about six occasions each year. We have a discussion on a variety of topics of a pastoral nature. These meetings usually used to take place at mid-day. In recent years the number of deacons has increased – many of whom are in full-time employment in various occupations. The number of priests in each Deanery is fewer than used to be the case and many of them are retired from full time parish ministry but are available to help in parishes as required. Our meetings now sometimes take place in the evenings to reflect the changing situation and the topics we discuss also reflect the changing parish scene.

When I came to this Deanery over ten years ago it was expected that our parishes would be affected far more speedily and radically than has been the case. But events are now catching up with us and parish life will have to alter sooner rather than later. One of the consequences of having had so many priests in the past has been the creation of a number of small parishes each with their own parish priest and usually three weekend Masses and weekday Masses. Another result of large numbers of priests was the tendency for priests to assume too prominent a place in parish life. The impression was too often given that the priest was in charge. He tended to be the one who took most of the initiative in the life of the parish and the people in the pews were all too often expected to be rather passive.

This was not meant to be the way. It certainly was not Christ's plan. Christ's plan is that we are all branches and he is the vine. We are all called to bear fruit. He says to all his followers that they are salt of the earth and light of the world. St Paul never tires of telling the members of the various Christian communities that they are all parts of one Body. Christ is the head of that body and we are all members of the body. As in a human body all the parts are indispensible. We all have an essential part to play in the life of the Church. We become part of the body of Christ through baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of entry into the Church.

We know that anyone is capable of baptising a person in a case of emergency. A parent, brother, sister, friend can do it. But ordinarily it is a bishop, priest or deacon who does it. Why? Because baptism is our entry into the Christian community and so it is administered by someone who is commissioned to act in the name of that community. We also know that baptism can be celebrated anywhere but the most appropriate place is the community's normal place of assembly, usually the church building. Baptism, being the rite of entrance into the Christian family is something bigger than a purely personal or family affair. This is spelled out when the minister addresses the person being baptised: 'the Christian community welcomes you with great joy.'

In the early Church baptism was followed immediately by confirmation. This is still done in Eastern Churches and in our Church in the case of adults. In confirmation - normally conferred by the bishop - the candidate is commissioned to take on responsibility for the Church's task and to become actively involved in pursuing it. There is the very ancient gesture of the imposition of hands. This is an invocation of the Holy Spirit to assist those confirmed in fulfilling public tasks. They are commissioned to take on responsibility as witnesses of Christ, committed to spreading and defending the faith by word and deed. The central and essential rite of confirmation is the anointing with oil - the oil of Chrism. This is to do with Christ-ening. The word Christ is Greek for 'the anointed one'. The Hebrew word is 'Messiah'. By being Christened we become a Christ-figure in the world. We receive the gift of the Holy Spirit, not simply for our personal sanctification but for carrying out the task of witnessing to Christ. Membership of the Church means being part of a community which celebrates the Eucharist. Full membership means full participation in the Eucharist. The word 'companion' has something to tell us about this. It is derived from two Latin words 'cum' which means 'with' and 'panis' which means 'bread'. A companion is a person with whom we share bread. By partaking of the Bread of Life we enter into communion, not just with the Lord, but also with all gathered around the table and with all the other members of his family. We become companions in the Church. Companions will have different gifts and different roles but they are all equally members. Real companionship always presupposes the recognition of a basic equality. We through baptism, the Eucharist and Confirmation are full and equal members of the Church - as fully and equally as even the Pope is. There cannot be a membership that is fuller than full and some cannot be more equal than others. If we are conscious of the anointed hands of the priest, we ought to be conscious too of the anointed head and forehead of every confirmed Christian -
