Father Liam asks: What is the third commandment? In the Catholic numbering of the Ten Commandments, it is: 'Keep holy the Sabbath day'. The Protestant numbering, however, gives it as: 'Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain.' This is very confusing. The sixth commandment in the Catholic version is: 'Thou shalt not commit adultery' whereas this is the seventh commandment in the Protestant version.

It might help if we simply look at how the commandments are set out in Scripture – in the Book of Exodus. 'And God spoke all these words saying, I am the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage.

You shall have no other gods before me.

You shall not make for yourself a graven image or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth; you shall not bow down to them or serve them, for the Lord your God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children to the third and fourth generation of those who hate me, bur showing steadfast love to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments' You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain, for the Lord will not hold him guiltless who takes his name in vain.

Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labour and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the lord your God, in it you shall not do any work, you or your son or your daughter, your manservant or your maidservant, or your cattle, or the sojourner who is within your gates; for in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea and all that is within them, and rested on the seventh day; therefore the lord blessed the Sabbath and hallowed it.

Honour your father and your mother, that your days may be long in the land which the Lord your God gives you. You shall not kill.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour.

You shall not covet your neighbour's house; you shall not covet your neighbour's wife or his maidservant, or his ox or anything that is your neighbour's (Exodus 20:1-17)

You will see that the Commandments are not individually numbered in Exodus for the sake of easy memorisation. The Church has historically condensed the passage from Exodus into the Ten Commandments. At the Reformation, the numbering adopted by the Protestants differed from that which had previously been the case. In fact only the First Commandment is common to both

In the Catholic scheme of things having strange gods and carving images and bowing down before them to worship them are grouped together as idolatry, while Protestants separate these statements into two distinct commandments. In the Protestant version, when it comes to coveting, the very different sins of coveting your neighbour's wife and his goods are combined into a single commandment whereas they are very distinct commandments in the version most of us have learned from childhood. Interestingly most German Lutherans have stuck with the Catholic numbering.

It is sometimes suggested that Catholics are 'hiding' part of the first commandment as we do not wish to draw attention to carving craven images. But the prohibition against worshipping false gods and carving idols for the sake of worshipping deal with the exact same sin – idolatry. Idol worship was a particularly common form of idolatry and God is making it clear that carving statues or fashioning images for the sake of worshipping them is evil. The Catholic Church condenses both into the single commandment – do not worship false gods. The Catholic Church forbids the worship of graven images just as it forbids the worship of any other false god. But it is clear that there is a correct use of statues and images in religious worship. Just five chapters later than the prohibition of carving images to worship them we find God commanding Moses to carve graven images of angels to be placed on top of the Ark of the covenant. This is in Chapter 25 of Exodus. God had not forgotten the prohibition he gave in Chapter 20. God was not contradicting himself. There is a world of difference in using images as part of our worship of a false god and using images to help us in our worship of the one true God.
