Father Liam says: Cardinal Robert Sarah is Prefect of the Congregation for Divine Worship and Discipline of the Sacraments. This is one of the most important Departments in the Roman Curia. The members of the various Congregations are appointed for a five year period but in practice they are often allowed to continue in office until they reach retirement at the age of seventy-five. Cardinal Sarah, is highly regarded as a very holy man and had been spoken of as a possible successor to Pope Francis as Bishop of Rome. But that was before Pope Francis has had occasion to take issue with him with public corrections. One had to do with a directive by the Pope a few months ago restoring to local Conferences of Bishops more authority in the matter of translating texts to be used in the celebration of Mass and the Sacraments. (There was widespread dissatisfaction some years ago when the Curia refused to recognise the competence of Conferences of Bishops to authorise new translations of the Missal in their areas.) Cardinal Sarah seemed to undermine this Papal directive suggesting that Bishops had no such power and Pope Francis felt it was necessary to take him to task on the matter. Previously Cardinal Sarah was strongly urging priest to preside at Mass while facing east. In practice this would often mean reverting to priests having their backs to the people at the celebration of Mass. Pope Francis speedily corrected him on this issue also.

The most recent intervention of Cardinal Sarah on how Mass should be celebrated refers to the manner in which people should receive Holy Communion. Local Conferences of Bishops issued suggestions many years ago on how people in England and Wales should receive the Sacred Host. The Bishops of England and Wales have suggested that we approach the altar in a reverent procession and bow our heads as we profess our belief in the Real Presence of Our Lord by responding 'Amen' when the minister says: 'The Body of Christ'. Then we receive the Sacrament either in the hand or on the tongue before receiving from the chalice if we so wish and returning to our places.

Very recently Cardinal Sarah wrote a foreword to a book by Father Federico Bortoli. In it the Cardinal says that the practice of receiving Communion in the hand is part of a 'diabolical attack' on the Church that diminishes reverence to God. He says: 'Truly the war between Michael and his Angels on one side and Lucifer on the other continues in the heart of the faithful. Satan's target is the Sacrifice of the Mass and the Real Presence of Jesus in the Consecrated Host.' Sarah tells us that we should receive Communion kneeling and on our tongue.

In the middle of the fourth century Bishop Cyril of Jerusalem gave this instruction to those who were about to join the Catholic Church at Easter: 'When you come forward for Holy Communion do not draw near with your hands wide open or with fingers spread apart. In stead, with your left hand make a throne for the right hand, which will receive the King. Receive the Body of Christ in the hollow of your hand and give the response 'Amen'. If we are to take Cardinal Sarah seriously this way of receiving constitutes 'the most insidious diabolical attack' on the Blessed Sacrament organised by Satan himself!

We are privileged to gather as disciples Sunday by Sunday at the Table of the Lord. This table makes present for us the words and actions of Jesus at his Last Supper and it anticipates the heavenly banquet as a pledge of future glory is given to us. The central image of all four of our scriptural accounts of the Eucharist is that of a single loaf which is blessed by the Lord, broken and shared and that of the one cup that Jesus blessed and gave to his disciples. Paul reminded the Corinthians: 'Because there is one loaf we who are many are one body for we all partake of the one loaf' (1Cor 10:17). Large patens pictured in mosaics from the early Church remind us of one loaf that was such a key element of the Eucharist. Once one has a broken leavened loaf with irregular cube-like morsels one has to use one's own hand. The sermons of the early Church spoke about those broken loaves with no hint of irreverence, but encouragement that if you have dipped your hand in that dish, you would not betray the Lord.

It is not clear when receiving on the tongue became common but it was certainly as a result of the move to unleavened 'altar bread' which spread in the west in the ninth and tenth centuries. One can only receive on the tongue if one has a flat disc-shaped wafer. Why the west moved to unleavened bread is disputed but it was certainly an innovation. It was yet another factor in the rift between the Church in the West and the Greek Churches. This change was accompanied by another development – there was a huge decrease in people coming to Communion. There was a growing sense of fear, of our unworthiness before the Lord. The vision of our gathering in joyful thanks for what the Father has done for us in Christ became dim. It has been one of the aims of the Vatican Council to revive it.
