Father Liam says: The altar in our church is very beautiful. In its own way it reminds us that we are the Easter people. Its central feature is the Paschal Lamb – reminding us that Jesus is the Lamb of God who by his death has taken away the sins of the world. Our church was built in the late sixties shortly after the Second Vatican Council. I believe that the parish priest, Canon Desmond McCarthy, was very much involved in the design of the church and reflected his enthusiasm for, and understanding of, the teachings of the Council. The way in which the congregation is encouraged to gather around the altar is central to the thinking of the Council on the nature of the Eucharist and on our identity as the people of God.

Yet the altar we now have is not the one that originally graced our church. It is not the one that Canon McCarthy chose. It is very much a pre-1960 altar (in fact 300 years before) that originally belonged to the convent in Portslade and it became available when the convent closed down. The original altar was moved to our Good Shepherd Chapel and is used for weekday Masses in the winter months. The Good Shepherd Chapel altar is much simpler and less ornate. It looks more like a table than an altar. It is not a solid piece but a horizontal surface supported by three pillars.

The first Eucharist was celebrated by Christ at the Last Supper as he sat at table with his disciples. This is how the disciples gathered for all their celebrations of the Eucharist for many centuries. The only mention that Jesus makes of the word 'altar' refers to the altar of the Tem[le in Jerusalem when he speaks of people bringing their gifts to the altar. But that Temple and altar was destroyed in 70 AD. The only altars in the early centuries of the Church were pagan ones. Several of these have been found – many of them in Banias, the ancient Caesarea Philippi – where Jesus went with his apostles and where Peter declared Jesus to be the Messias, the Son of the living God. The Jews and Christians shunned these pagan altars erected to worship false gods. Not having altars left Christians open to charges of atheism and of ignoring the gods. From the mid-second century they began to say that their tables were their altars.

When they were allowed freedom to practice their faith and especially when Christianity became the state religion they built their own churches and the table of the Eucharist took on more and more the features of an altar. The more splendid their churches were, the more splendid their altars became but they retained their links to the original Eucharistic Table. In the altar of our church (the 'Portslade' altar) we still see four columns, two on each side. Christian altars continued to have these four columns as reminders of the time when the 'Lord's Table' was actually a table supported by four legs.

For the Jews and early Christians it was at table in their own homes that remembering and thanking God most often took place. Most of us do not think of our tables as domestic places of religion. Too often when we eat we fail to remember that the goodness on the table is God's gift; prayer before and after meals was a hugely important part of Jewish life and Christian life.

So much of the ministry of Jesus took place around a multitude of tables. He welcomes sinners and eats with them, he forgives sinners and speaks good news to them. He shows his solidarity with them by joining them at table. His critics even called him a glutton and a drunkard. In becoming man, he pitched his tent among us as John describes it (1:14) He then is ready to meet us at every table at which we gather, the table in each of our tents. But there is one table above all to which he invites us – the Table of the Lord. 'Altar' is one way of thinking about what we are doing at the Lord's table but it is not the only way.
