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

Father Liam says: This year Remembrance Sunday coincides with Armistice Day, 11th November. It will also, of course, mark the centenary of the end of World War I. Remembrance Sunday this year deserves a special consideration so it should be celebrated fittingly.

When the British Expeditionary Force of 80,000 men sailed for France in August 1914, most people expected that the war would be over by Christmas. Fifty three chaplains accompanied these men of whom ten were Catholic chaplains. At the outbreak of war there were one hundred and thirteen permanently commissioned chaplains serving a regular army of over 247,000 men deployed all over the British Empire. Of their 113 chaplains, 88 were Anglican, 15 were Catholic and 10 were Presbyterian. During the course of the war an additional 5,053 chaplains of all denominations served in the army. Over 800 Catholic chaplains served as chaplains to the forces.

Before and during the war the army and Royal Navy had different approaches to Catholic chaplaincy. The army had commissioned Catholic chaplains. The Admiralty did not. In 1914 there were very few commissioned Catholic army chaplains but as the war progressed and the demand for chaplains increased, hundreds of Catholic priests were given temporary commissions. They came from British and Irish dioceses and from Religious Orders. They included parish priests, seminary professors, teachers, monks, missionaries. Young and middle aged and some older than that. Catholic priests volunteered for service with the Royal Navy but the numbers employed, rather than commissioned, was derisory given the huge size of the navy and the large number of Catholic sailors.

Chaplains to the Royal Navy were always ordained clergymen of the Established Church. Sailors who were Catholic, Presbyterian, Wesleyan and other Christian denominations were allowed to absent themselves from Anglican services – on condition that they could be spared from their duties on board. They were supposed to be given the opportunity to 'attend Divine Service at their respective places of worship on shore'. Despite the large number of Irish Catholics in the Royal Navy, Catholic priests were not allowed on navy ships but were employed as officiating chaplains on shore bases. Their rates of pay were considerably less than those received by Anglican chaplains. Some Catholic officers ignored Admiralty policy and allowed priests on board, especially in Port. In 1908 a Benedictine monk became the first Catholic priest to celebrate Mass on a Royal Navy ship in home waters since the reign of King James II.

Following the restoration of the Catholic Hierarchy of England and Wales in 1850, the ecclesiastical responsibility for Catholic military chaplains was vested in the Catholic Bishop of Southwark. Southwark was the diocese with the biggest military bases, ports and Naval stations and so the government dealt with the Bishop of Southwark in all chaplaincy matters. When Bishop Bourne, who became Bishop of Southwark in 1897 became Bishop of Westminster in 1903, he remained responsible for the chaplains to the Forces. In 1917 the first Catholic Bishop to the Forces was appointed.

The British government's declaration of War against Germany and Austria-Hungary in August 2014 placed British Catholics in a dilemma. Great Britain had declared war against nations with large Catholic populations. British Catholics were often regarded as being outside the mainstream of national, social and religious life as they owed allegiance to the Pope in religious matters. Pope Benedict XV was tremendously active in striving for peace and the avoidance of War. Cardinal Bourne of Westminster was particularly keen to be perceived as a strong supporter of government policy and he was openly critical of the stance taken by the Pope. The position was sensitive in many parishes and religious communities where there were people of German, Belgium and French origin. The Irish bishops generally spoke for the whole of Catholic Ireland when they supported Britain and its Empire in the War against Germany. Many Irish felt that if Britain could fight for the rights of a small Catholic nation like Belgium then Home Rule should be awarded to Ireland. Despite the opposition of those who would not fight for Britain, over 200,000 Irish were to serve in the British army during the War, among them quite a few military chaplains.

The Royal Air Force was formed on 1st April 1918 and steps were taken to establish an independent RAF chaplaincy. In October 1918 the first RAF chaplain-in-chief was appointed but there were no Catholic RAF chaplains until the war had ended.
