Father Liam says: One of the notable features of life just now is 'Fridays for Climate'. Thousands of young people in many parts of the world seek to make their concerns known about the failure of governments to act appropriately to counteract climate change. It is calculated that on Friday 15th March more than a million school-children from 120 countries in more than 2,000 locations took part in marches with placards and chants and with unbounded energy demanding that their governments take the issue of the health of the planet more seriously. Climate change has become the issue of this generation. These young people will be voting soon and so politicians will be forced eventually to take notice. The issue has not been given the priority it deserves by the main political parties throughout the world. How has it come about that it has recently inspired such passionate response among school children?

One young person in particular has been hugely influential in galvanising opinion among the young. She is a 16 year old schoolgirl, Greta Thunberg, from Sweden. She started demonstrating on Fridays – rather than go to school – demanding that Sweden take serious action about the issue. Photographs of her with her placard outside her town hall, the Swedish Parliament and other official buildings began to be noticed on social media. The videos then ensured that Greta began to go viral. Greta has Asperger's. It has been suggested that this helps people with the condition to see things more clearly and speak more effectively. She has spoken at the recent United Nations Climate Change Conference in Poland and to the leaders of the rich nations at Davos and to the bureaucrats of the European Union. There is something astonishingly direct about the way Greta speaks. When an Australian education minister said that the actions were unlawful and that children should be in school she told him that his statement 'belongs in a museum'.

Perhaps a further reason why Greta has been able to galvanise so much support, from young people has to do with education. In school children learn about the green-house effect, the warming oceans, increasing pollution, the rising seas, the loss of bio-diversity, the extreme weather, the acidifying oceans. They learn about the importance of reducing carbon emissions and embracing renewable energy and adapting our buildings and houses and all other ways in which it is possible to reduce the amount of carbon in the atmosphere if we really want to. How much of a difference would it make if Members of Parliament worldwide were exposed over a couple of weekends, to expert information on the climate and on the measures available to governments to move their countries away from fossil fuels. Obviously many would totally renounce all such 'expert opinion' but surely it would help others to see things more clearly. I realise that in this whole area, Ireland is nowhere near meeting its obligations under the Paris Agreement. The Irish government don't seem to have any plans or policies to even try to achieve the targets that they agreed to. Britain is not doing enough but it is doing much better than its near neighbour.

Greta Thunberg said to the United Nations in December: 'You are not mature enough to tell it like it is. Even that burden you leave to us young people. You say you love your children above all else – and yet you are stealing their future in front of their very eyes.' When the next General Election is called will there be a single candidate running for election in this constituency who will give voice to concerns about the future of our environment – the health of the home God has given to us to protect and safeguard and to hand on to future generations? And what about the local and European elections in May? Our environment is very much a local issue and a European one and a religious one. It is all about how we respond to God's gifts and how we care for one another.
