

Father Liam says: Today we celebrate the feast day of the Lord's gift of his Body and Blood in the Eucharist. When we meet here on Sundays a lot of what we do is centred on a book and a lot is centred on a table. It is a special book of course because it is the Word of the Lord and the table is very special – it is the Table of the Lord. Much of our time together on the Lord's Day is spent on listening to, and reflecting on, the reading from the Book of Life - the Scriptures - and on being nourished by the Lord at the table he has set for us. The meaning of the word 'Church' is' those who gather' or 'the assembly' and because we are the church we are privileged, and called, to assemble. We who gather listen to God's Word, pray together and give thanks and praise over the bread and wine that, as at the Last Supper, at Christ's Word, become for us his Body and Blood. Each Sunday we follow many paths to come here. We may come singly or as one of a family group. But we gather to give expression to the fact that we belong together. Baptism has made us the Church of Christ. We come to set all aloneness aside. We reach out to one another, recognising that we are brothers and sisters. We are not just a group of people who happen to be in the same place, at the same time. That is what happens at a train station or a cinema. But this is different because we are the one body of Christ. 'There are indeed many different members but one body' as St Paul expresses it in his First Letter to the Corinthians (12:20) we assemble at Sunday Mass to praise and thank God together. Do we really need three Sunday Masses? It certainly does not foster togetherness. And it certainly will not continue indefinitely. Being church means we are together. We treasure and celebrate our togetherness.

If I board a bus alone I probably look for a seat alone. If I'm with a friend we probably sit together. We don't need to pay much attention to anyone else on the bus. St Paul somewhere uses a word - he wrote in Greek - that suggests we are like people on a boat that is rowed by everyone on board. This is what liturgy is - something done by everyone together. Sunday Mass is what we do together. So we should try to get together. Will there be a time when without even thinking about it we come through the door and head for an empty place close to the altar? If we come forward when we arrive then the spaces will fill from the front. If a row is empty, how about taking a place in the middle of the row as if inviting others to sit beside us. Sitting at the end of the row may not be sending out the best message. It may make it more difficult for someone else to find a place. It is always good to see what message we are sending out. It is important that we send out a welcoming message. If we routinely fill the seats at the back those coming later may find it harder to find a place. This is particularly the case when larger numbers gather. But it is good practice at all times. When it comes to the time when Masses are fewer it will be very important. We must do the best we can to make our church welcoming to all of us. There is no special holiness in getting close to the altar but there is a holiness in getting close to one another and showing welcome and consideration and hospitality to others. Giving one another a smile and sharing your Christian name with them would help in building community. Much is lost from our Eucharist if we fail to welcome one another! Perhaps when we sit closer together we will sing more confidently also.

So many people have a lot of preparations to do before they arrive at church. Some have families to cope with or children to get ready. Getting to church can be rather frenetic for some. I came from a large family and can remember the stress and strain our parents had in getting us in some kind of shape on Sunday mornings. But for those who can manage it, it would be good to find a few moments beforehand to have a look at what the scripture readings are about. In the Main Porch on the wall to the left of the main door there are copies of Sunday Plus giving the prayers and readings of the following Sunday. These are not just for the benefit of those allocated ro read but for others as well. Near the door to the sacristy there are large print copies of the prayers and readings of the Mass as well as large print copies of the weekly Newsletter. We thank those who give out Mass sheets and hymn books and a welcoming word to all who gather Sunday by Sunday

Another aid to participation in the Mass is the Children's chapel. Those who use it can see and hear the celebration of the Eucharist while not being heard themselves. Gary has helped to make it very inviting and welcoming for the children by his painting of Noah's Ark. There are also Happy Bags, filled according to age, available in both porches to assist our young people in being part of our gathering.
