- 13. TURNING TIDES (Worthing Churches Homeless Projects): In a recent Annual Report we learn that in 2018 Turning Tides, who now have centres in Littlehampton and Horsham as well as Worthing, supported 2,028 men and women throughout the year. On any one night 169 people are accommodated in their housing and 485 people accessed Breakfast in their three hubs. Items they currently need: Coffee, Sugar, Baked Beans, Tinned Tomatoes, Tinned Meals, Tinned Meat, Tinned Fish, Cooking Oil, Juice, Squash. Also Cleaning products and Deodorants. In clothing they need small waist Jeans, Men's Hoodies. Boxers and Men's T-Shirts. Many thanks to those who are so generous in their donations throughout the year.

Father Liam says: Julian of Norwich was a famous mystic and writer from the 14th Century. She lived as an anchoress, walled up in a little cell at the site of a church now named in her honour, St Julian's church. Her original cell was destroyed after the Reformation and has now been rebuilt as a side chapel. Here she wrote her famous book 'Revelations of Divine Love'. The chapel has a place to light candles before a stone crucifix.

Anchorite's cells were part of the structure of a number of ancient churches. It was a room built into the walls of the church with three small windows. An anchorite or anchoress would be bricked up inside until the end of their life. What is so remarkable about St Julian was the enthusiasm with which she used her confinement to express her message. At the time England was plagued by the Black Death and mired in despair and famine and suffering. There was the violent suppression of the Peasant's Revolt. From her cell Julian handed out words of blinding light and optimism that brought her instant fame. People came from near and far to consult her through one of her tiny windows.

Her book is the first written in English by a woman. It is based on a series of visions she had when she was aged 30 during a life-threatening illness. The visions relate mainly to Christ's suffering and crucifixion and to the Virgin Mary. Having reflected on them for another 30 years she wrote them all down towards the end of the 14th Century. Her optimism is infectious. She views creation through her conviction of God's love for all his creatures. She contemplates a hazelnut in the palm of her hand and rejoices in its three properties: the first is that God made it, second is that God loves it, the third that God keeps it. Another famous saying of hers is: 'All shall be well, and all shall be well and all manner of things shall be well'.

Nearer home an intact anchorite cell can be seen at St Nicholas church, Compton, south of Guildford. This was a stopping point on the Winchester to Canterbury Pilgrimage Way. The former anchorite cell is located in the south wall of the chancel. In between long periods of prayer and contemplation, the anchorite would give advice to pilgrims and visitors who asked for it through a small window, A cruciform squint would look out from the cell on to the altar of the church so that the hermit could follow the Mass and receive Holy Communion. The technical name for this little window is hagioscope – viewing that which is holy. The heavy wooden sill in front of the squint has been worn through by the elbows of devoted anchorites. The scorch marks of candles testify to the countless hours of nocturnal prayer.

A famous anchorite lived in the nearby church of St James at Shere, seven miles east of Compton. Christine Carpenter was enclosed there for three years until 1332 when she left her cell. Within a few months she changed her mind and asked to be re-enclosed. There are copies of the letters to and from the Pope of the time permitting her to leave and re-enter.

Some distance away in Somerset the Parish church of St Michael and All Angels in Haselbury Plucknett has a small stone side building which was the cell of St. Wulfric where he spent the last 29 years of his life. The cell became a shrine when he died in 1154. He was initially buried in his cell. However a row broke out between the local parishioners and monks from the nearby Montacute Abbey. The monks thought his burial place should be in their abbey. They regarded him as one of their own as they had supplied him with food. The local people regarded him as theirs as he had lived in their church for so long. In the end the parish priest put an end to the argument by removing St Wulfrics mortal remains to their secret grave. One consequence was that his body escaped being desecrated at the Reformation.
