Father Liam says: 'THIS IS OUR COMMON HOME' is the title of a very significant event happening in our Deanery on Saturday next, 14th September. It is being organised by Worthing Deanery Justice and Peace Group and is taking place at St Peter's Church Hall, Shoreham (BN43 5WG if using Satnav) It is about the health of our planet and what that means for all of us. This is a half-day event from 9.30 am to 12.30 pm. Among other things we will learn what our Deanery and Diocese are doing to combat the Climate Emergency and there will be discussions and suggestions about what we can do as individuals and as a parish to cherish the earth – God's first command to us.

In recent weeks there has been great publicity about the 16-year-old Swedish girl Greta Thunberg who arrived in New York at the end of August having made a zero-carbon journey on board a solar-powered yacht. The purpose of her voyage was to address the United Nations on the climate crisis. She has been a great champion of the cause for most of a year now – so much so that she is recognised around the world just by her Christian name. There is only one Greta, and may God bless and strengthen her. Detractors have pointed out that some of her crew may be flying back from New York afterwards and some observers, eager to knock the teenager, claim to have spotted single-use plastic bottles on board. She has set an example by hitching a ride on the boat even though it may be seen as a wildly impractical way of getting around. Not everyone has the time or the opportunity to go to and come back from New York in a boat co-skippered by a member of the Monaco Royal family.

Before Greta even got on a boat to sail to Donald Trump's home city of New York she had laid it on the line for the President of the US. In one of her videos she pleaded with Trump: 'If you don't take action now you are going to be seen as one of the greatest villain's in history. You say you love your children above all else and yet you steal their future.' When her boat finally sailed into New York she sounded like a disappointed teacher writing a report on a difficult pupil: 'My message to him is just to listen to the science and he obviously doesn't do that.'

Trump himself has rowed back from being an out and out climate change denier. Back in 2012 he tweeted: 'The concept of global warming was created by and for the Chinese in order to make U S manufacturing non-competitive.' More recently he has said: 'I think something's happening, something's changing and it'll change back again. I don't think it's a hoax. I think there's probably a difference but I don't know that it's man-made. I'm not denying climate change but it could very well go back.'

Up to two hundred celebrities and business people were reported to have gathered at a resort in Sicily in July to discuss climate change. 114 private jets were chartered to get there. Among the speakers were Leonardo DiCaprio, Tom Cruise and Prince Harry. Celebrities who speak on ecological matters have been easy targets of critics if they are seen to fail to practise what they preach. It may seem that everybody else is being given an excuse to do nothing.

Mary Robinson, former president of Ireland, is the most prominent Irish campaigner on climate change, warning that it is the single most important issue facing humanity. She recently pleaded 'Make climate change personal in your life because it is that serious. We can't afford not to. Do something that you weren't doing before so that you know you've made it personal in your life. You've got a carbon footprint. You're responsible for that. You can do something. You can recycle more efficiently. You can use public transport.' She acknowledges that she flies around the world as a speaker and climate change activist. But she ensures that every flight is offset — extra money is paid to compensate for the carbon emissions produced.

According to a recent BBC report a typical economy class transatlantic flight from London to New York produces an average 2,700 kg of carbon dioxide per person. That is more than the average amount released in a year by a typical car. Many regular flyers now seek to cancel their CO² emissions by buying an offset. First they can calculate how much carbon they have emitted by inserting their flight details on-line. Then they buy an 'offset' that seeks to reduce the amount of carbon being emitted elsewhere. Typically, this involves a donation to a scheme to plant trees or a renewable energy project. Planting trees is not necessarily the magic solution to emissions. It depends on the type of trees and where they are planted. If they are planted where carbon is already being stored naturally, such as in a peat bog, it could actually make the situation worse. Half the money from carbon offsetting could be going to the administrative cost.

We all have a responsibility to do what we can to tackle climate change. That involves action to get the sort of system change that is needed and action to reduce our own carbon footprint. That includes everyone, celebrity or not. What is very clear now is that political action is much more important that individual action. Individual action is important. Political action is mightily important. With a General Election imminent what can we do to ensure that climate change is firmly on the agenda? Hope to see you in Shoreham!
