Father Liam says: Next Sunday we observe the Feast of the Epiphany. It is now celebrated in this country always on a Sunday even though traditionally it is known as the Twelfth day of Christmas – which is 6<sup>th</sup> January. The Gospel is always from St Matthew's Gospel as this is the only gospel that speaks of the star leading the Magi to the Child Jesus. But this year – since it is the Year of Matthew – our gospel for today's Feast of the Holy Family is also about the Magi but now they have left Bethlehem. Our gospel reading today omits to mention that they tricked Herod by returning to their own country by another way and does not mention the massacre of the infants.; that will be for another day. Today the emphasis is on Joseph taking the Child and his mother out of harms way by fleeing to the land of Egypt. The Church puts before us in todays reading what is directly relevant to the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Next year it will be put before us on the Feast of the Holy Family an incident that only Luke mentions – the presentation of Jesus in the Temple where Simeon and Anna recognised how special the Child was.

Luke and Matthew are the only gospel writers who give us any narrative about the infancy of Jesus. All the other books of the New Testament are completely silent about it. Luke and Matthew approach the conception, birth and infancy of Jesus in entirely different ways. They were writing their gospel accounts with their own Christian communities in mind. So they wrote from different perspectives and were probably not even aware of what the other was writing. It took a long time for the Church to decide which books were inspired and belonged to the Sacred Scriptures.

Matthew was writing for a Christian community that had come to the faith from Judaism. They were very familiar with the Jewish scriptures and Matthew was at great pains to emphasise that Jesus was indeed the Messiah that their scriptures had foretold. In today's gospel, for example, he quotes twice from the Sacred Books of Israel to reinforce the message that Jesus is indeed the Christ – the Messiah. Some of his community – under pressure from their fellow Jews – were wavering. To strengthen them in their faith he wrote his gospel in the way he did. When Matthew's readers heard the name Joseph they would have thought of Joseph, the Patriarch. He was the Bible's most famous interpreter of revelation in dreams. He is called the 'Master of Dreams' in Genesis 37:19 He went down to Egypt where he rose to great eminence and influence with pharaoh through his dream-mastery. He was able to save his family and many families from famine. It is not accidental that in Matthew's Gospel, Joseph the husband of Mary, is the principal New Testament figure to receive revelations in a series of dreams and the only one to go down to Egypt.

In the Old Testament, after the Patriarch Joseph brought the Israelites to Egypt, a wicked Pharaoh tried to kill all the Hebrew male children because the Jews were becoming so numerous. The infant Moses escaped ultimately to save his people by leading them out of Egypt. Similarly in Matthew's Gospel the wicked King Herod sought to kill all the male children at Bethlehem. The infant Jesus (whom Matthew portrays as the new Moses) escapes the wicked designs of Herod to ultimately return from Egypt and save his people. On Moses' way to the Promised Land he meets a famous Magus from the East, Balaam. Balaam and his two servants are rather like the Magi in Matthew's Gospel. Balaam was enabled to see the star of the future King David rising from Israel. The wicked King Balak tried to employ Balaam against the Israelites. The Book of Numbers (24:17) speaks of Balaam's prediction: 'a star shall come forth from Jacob, and a sceptre shall arise from Israel.' Similarly Matthew's Magi obey God rather than the wicked King Herod because they have seen the Rising Star of the true King of the Jews. Both Matthew and Luke stress that Jesus' descent is to be traced genealogically through Joseph who was of the House of David. According to Jewish Law, Joseph's acknowledgement of Jesus would make him the legal father of the child. Being legal father did not depend on physical fatherhood and so Jesus was truly a Son of David. Matthew and Luke also stress that Jesus was conceived by the creative power of the Holy Spirit. So he was truly the Son of God. The identity of Jesus as Son of David and Son of God is the major message the Gospels were written to convey. Neither Matthew nor Luke were simply composing a life of Jesus. They were conveying a religious message. The infancy narratives were not primarily written to satisfy our thirst for information about the early life of Jesus.
