FATHER LIAM SAYS: In today's Mass we have the opening words of St Mark's Gospel: 'The beginning of the Good News about Jesus the Messiah, The Son of God.' There is no reference in the text itself as to who wrote it. It is by far the shortest of the four gospels that form part of the New Testament and it is generally accepted to have been the first of them. The Gospels are the books most revered by Christians of all the writings of the Bible. 'Gospel' is the old English word for 'Good News' and Mark invented this form of literature. The Gospels are the accounts of some of the deeds and words of Jesus written from the conviction that he died and rose again to save us and that he is the 'Son of God. The followers of Jesus had passed on by word of mouth what he said and did but it was not until Peter and Paul had been put to death in Rome during the fierce persecution of Christians begun by the Emperor Nero in 64AD that the urgent necessity of having an authentic written account was first seen. Mark is thought to have been a co-worker of both Peter and Paul. Before any of the Gospels had been written Paul and others had hand-written letters of encouragement to various infant Christian communities; some of these too in time became recognised as having been inspired by the Holy Spirit and were acclaimed to be part of the Divine Scriptures.

Who decided which books were part of thew Bible? The Bible itself does not give us a list. There were many revered books about Jesus but who could authoritatively state which were inspired? It was Pope Damasus who was elected Pope in 366. On Bible Sunday we have a lot to thank St Damasus for and his great spiritual helper, St Jerome.

We also thank our present Pope. Pope Francis has written a book in response to the pandemic – the first book ever written by a Pope in response to a major world crisis. It is entitled 'Let us Dream: The Path to a Better World Future'. It is published by Simon & Schuster at £10.99. Please don't buy me a copy as I already have one! But you might like to buy one for yourself and perhaps for others. In his reflection on the Covid-19 Pandemic he pays tribute to women as frontline workers and he suggests that female leaders had handled the crisis better that their male counterparts. 'A sign of hope in this crisis is the leading role of women. Women have been at the same time among the most affected and the most resilient in this crisis'. 'affected, because they are more likely to be on the front line of the pandemic – about 70% of all those working in health care world-wide are women – but also because they are harder hit economically while working in the informal or unpaid sector. The countries with women as Presidents or Prime Ministers have on the whole reacted better and more quickly that others, making decisions swiftly and communicating them with empathy.'

Pope Francis poses the question: 'Could it be that in this crisis the perspective women bring is what the world's needs at this time to face the coming challenges? The 83 year old Pope argues that female economists offer fresh thinking and a possible blueprint for the new kind of economy the crisis has shown the world needs. 'For me it's clear: We must redesign the economy so that it can offer every person access to a dignified existence while protecting and regenerating the natural world.' He highlights the work of Mariano Mazzucato and Kate Raworth who are seeking to overhaul models obsessed with growth in gross domestic product as the single over-riding goal. 'I see them advocating a more 'material' economy, one that is not focused solely on growth and profit but ask s how economies can be geared to helping people to participate in society and thrive.' He says that qualified women should have equal access to leadership, equivalent salaries and other opportunities. The right to these has been one of the great social gains of modern times.

Pope Francis is very aware that much more should be done in the structure of Church governance to promote the involvement of women. He has made advances in securing this in the workings of the Vatican but he realises that progress is far too slow. He is meeting with much opposition by those operating the levers of power but he certainly has not abandoned his efforts. He himself is showing extraordinary resilience. The fact that he is not as successful as he would like does not prevent him from pressing on with reforming the Curia and at the same time trying to encourage necessary changes in the wider world. He 'sees this crisis as a threshold moment' according to the English journalist, Austen Ivereigh, who has facilitated this book 'in which we can choose or refuse change.' Covid-19 Francis says has unmasked other pandemics, such as the virus of indifference towards the elderly, the poor, the homeless, those on the margins of society.' He speaks of the anti-racist protests sparked by the death of George Floyd and the abuse crisis in the Church and the parallels with the # Me Too movement. He speaks of periods of crisis in his life that profoundly changed him. He challenges people to think about what they want a post-Covid world to look like so that this time the crisis might be used to make a better world. It is significant that there are four women in President Elect Biden's economic team

'Let us Dream' is about how God enters history, above all at times of suffering and crisis. It is about how we can open out to receive the Holy Spirit and the graces a merciful God holds out to us in tribulation, which we must be careful to seize and not resist. Austen Ivereigh who suggested to Pope Francis that he should write this book, felt that it read naturally and fluently. He told Francis that this would be the first book written by a Pope in which the Bishop of Rome would not sound slightly weird in English. Francis was pleased to hear it!

Perhaps if you are worried that a Christmas visit might pose a risk to you or to loved ones it might be wise to forego it this once. Like many priests, living far from their place of origin, I haven't spent a Christmas or New Year with my family since ordination – in my case 54 years. I don't think I was missed! But I do hope that those who are ill and frail can see their loved ones this Christmas. And what about Christmas Mass? People might ask your advice. Could I suggest that if people haven't been coming to Mass since March, Christmas would not be the right time to stat again. Numbers are greatly restricted and we have to observe all the precautions about face-hands-space and ventilation. The church might be draughty as we are told to keep doors open to allow fresh air to circulate. Keep safe and keep one another safe!
