

FATHER LIAM SAYS: In his book 'The Shed that Fed a Million Children' Magnus MacFarlane-Barrow tells us the story of 'Mary's Meals' in which he played and continues to play a pivotal role. One of the events that led to the establishment of that great movement was his visit with three other teenagers, all family members, to the village of Medjugorje in 1983 when he was fifteen years old. In June 1981, two teenagers from the village saw a lady on the hillside whom they recognised as the 'Gospa', the Croatian term for the Virgin Mary. On following days they were joined by four other young people who also saw her and heard her speak to them. She told them that she was the Virgin Mary, the Queen of Peace. She said: 'I have come to tell the world that God exists. He is fulness of life and to enjoy the fulness and obtain peace you must return to God.' From then on these six children began seeing and talking to the Virgin Mary daily. Soon thousands of local people were gathering on the hillside to be with the children as they conversed with someone that all the others present could not see. The communist authorities strongly disapproved of these displays of religious fervour and the visionaries were questioned and threatened with detention in a psychiatric hospital but none retracted any part of their claims – not even the youngest who was nine. The family with whom the MacFarlane-Barrow children stayed knew the visionaries well. When the parents of Magnus visited Medjugorje shortly afterwards they decided to turn their family home and guest house at Dalmally in Argyll into a house of prayer, which it is still today.

Soon the quiet village of Medjugorje was embraced in horrible conflict. The Yugoslavia they had visited a few years before was tearing itself apart in civil war. In Medjugorje, Our Lady Queen of Peace was still appearing to the same six young people. Over the years, her message was in variably about the way to peace. Exactly ten years to the day after she first appeared to them, the first shots of the war had been fired.

The MacFarlane-Barrow family decided that they must do something to alleviate the plight of those caught up in the war. Within three weeks of the outbreak of the war they were heading for Dover in an overladen Land-rover on their way with supplies to Bosnia-Herzegovina. When they returned home they discovered that their shed was filled with medical aid, dry food and clothing. Magnus immediately decided to resign his job on a fish farm and put his house up for sale. From that time the shed has been in constant use as his life became dominated by bringing relief to the suffering throughout the world. Every Catholic family in Scotland was contacted seeking support and the response was incredible. When the large Muslim community in Glasgow heard of this venture, they became very involved too. Many of Pakistani descent were involved in the food industry and often donated their surplus stock. The deprived areas of Glasgow donated significantly more food than the more affluent suburbs. They were given permission to hold a street collection before the Scottish Cup Final between Glasgow Rangers and Glasgow Celtic. The giving was incredible and the link with those Glasgow Clubs has continued ever since.

They had a large lorry but they were driving back across Europe on each return trip with a huge empty trailer. Magnus came to know Sir Tom Farmer, the founder of Kwik Fit, the enormous car tyre and exhaust fitting company. He had previously visited the Prayer Centre owned by Magnus parents in Argyll. At this time he was importing lots of tyres to Scotland from Slovenia and Northern Italy. He was happy to pay the going rate for carrying tyres to Kwik Fit depots.

A priest friend of Magnus worked as a missionary in Africa. Many of his colleagues were working in Liberia. Many were living in displaced camps around the capital Monrovia where the needs of the people seemed ever more acute than those in Bosnia-Herzegovina. In addition to the food, clothes, medicine, towels and soap were identified as urgently needed. One of the housekeepers in the world-famous hotel and golf course at Gleneagles heard of this urgent need for soap. She and her colleagues began to collect the bars of soap which had until then been discarded after one use by the hotel guests. They tied them in plastic bags for collection, as well as candles, also desperately needed in Liberia. They too were used only once in Gleneagles Hotel. Magnus used to drive out of the beautiful grounds of that hotel smiling as he transported these sumptuous things discarded by people of great wealth and send them on their way to those living in abject poverty.
