<u>FATHER LIAM SAYS:</u> The World Meteorological Organisation (WMO) has issued a seriously worrying report on the planets health. It confirms that 2020 has been one of the three hottest years on record as global temperature rise continued without pause. Only the cooling influence of the weather system known as La Nina that occurs every few prevented all previous records being broken. The WMO report warned that despite Covid almost every indicator of climate breakdown worsened. The economic slowdown temporarily reduced new emissions of greenhouse gases this had 'no discernible impact' on overall concentrations in the atmosphere. The U N General Secretary, Antonio Guterres said: 'This is a frightening report and it needs to be read by all leaders and decision makers in the world. We are on the verge of an abyss.'

The Report confirmed grave predictions made as 2020 drew to a close. Average global temperature is now 1.2 degrees higher than in pre-industrial times and inches ever closer to the 1.5 degrees threshold beyond which scientists warn extreme weather and associated climate disaster will escalate rapidly. The highest temperature ever measured of the Arctic Circle was recorded in Russia where the mercury hit 38 °C. Arctic sea ice was at its second lowest volume ever at the end of the summer melt. Antarctic ice melt increased and Greenland lost 152 billion metric tons of A loss of 200 billion would equate to double all the water that flows out of the Rhine in a year. 'Sea level rise used 1.2 mm per year but recently we have been observing 3.4 mm per year,' said Professor Petteri Taalas, Secretary General of WMO. 'This is coming from the melting ice of the glaciers. Ten million people were displaced during the first half of the year alone.' '2020 was another unpredictable year of extreme weather and climate disasters' said the of the UN. 'The causes are well known – human activities, human decisions and human folly. The effects are disastrous. The data in this report should alarm us all.'

There was an Earth Day leaders' summit convened on 22nd April by President Biden. This aimed to galvanise world leaders in advance of the UN climate summit in Glasgow in November, described by Mr. Gutteres as a 'make or break' for humanity. The Earth Day leaders' summit brought together by Zoom over 40 leaders .from countries with high emissions and from some of the world's most vulnerable countries. This Earth Day summit will be followed by summits of the G-20 and at the UN in September leading up to the crucial COP 26 in Glasgow in November. To be a success these events must result in agreement to a reduction of CO² by 45 per cent by 2030 along with cuts in other warming pollutants like methanol and soot. They also need to chart a green recovery from Covid. Above all, perhaps, they need to agree on financial help to poor nations. In 2009 they promised \$100 billion annually by 2020 to combat climate change. It hasn't materialised.

It is far more difficult to achieve targets than to set them. Prime Minister Johnson has announced an impressive target when he pledged to cut the UK's greenhouse gas emissions by 78 per cent compared with 1990 levels. Some commentators and politicians argue that this new target would make the government's £27 billion road building scheme airport expansions ever harder to justify. The UK Government feels a particular responsibility to set ambitious targets because it is hosting the vital COP 26 climate summit in four months time.
