

FATHER LIAM SAYS: Today the mood of the Church changes. In the middle of Advent there is a brighter tone as we gather together. On this third Sunday of Advent the favoured liturgical colour is not purple but rose. The tabernacle veil and the priest's vestments today reflect this more joyful note as does the candle we light today on our Advent wreath. The name given to this Sunday is Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete is the Latin word for 'Let us rejoice'.

Our first reading today begins: 'Shout for joy, daughter of Zion. Israel shout aloud! Rejoice, exult with all your heart.' This is all easier said than done. We are all feeling apprehensive, as we have been for a considerable time. There is the Coronavirus pandemic still active and many ae worried about the climate crisis and economic uncertainties and no doubt we also have other concerns that weigh us down. The people that the Prophet Zephaniah was directly addressing had certainly much to worry about as well as have the people of every age. But Zephaniah tells us why we should rejoice. 'The Lord, King of Israel is in your midst'. The response to today's Psalm has the same message: 'Sing and shout for joy for great in your midst is the Holy One of Israel.' Emmanuel, God with us, is the Saviour beyond anything that Zephaniah or the Psalmist could imagine.

The four Gospels are the brief books that open the New Testament where they are the first writings placed before us. They are not the first New Testament writings to have been written. This honour belongs to the Letters of Paul but the Gospels are the writings that have most influence on the lives of Christians, so they have always been placed at the beginning of the New Testament. The first Gospel of the four that opens the New Testament is the Gospel of Matthew, though Mark's Gospel was the first to be written. It was thought to have been written around the year 60 AD.

The Gospels attributed to Matthew, Mark and Luke are known as the Synoptic Gospels because they can be looked at together. They are similar in content and in the order they place the events they narrate. The fourth Gospel attributed to John is the last to be written and differs from the other three to a far greater extent than they differ from one another. The Gospel at the last Mass of Christmas Day comes from John though he gives us no infancy scene.

People sometimes think of the Gospels as biographies of Jesus. But the Gospels tell us very little about Jesus' childhood, his family background, his education or even what he looked like. What all the Gospel writers were seeking to achieve can be summed up in the words that come at the end of John's Gospel: 'These things are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life in his name(John 20:31).

The various writers of the Gospels arranged the material that they had about Jesus in order to portray him in a way that people could understand and come to know him, love him and serve him as their Lord and God. They wrote their Gospels between the years 60 and 100 AD or so. The designations that we find in the New Testament, such as 'The Gospel according to John' are the result of late second century scholar's attempts to identify the authors of works that had no identification. No Gospel writer indicated who he was. The closest we come to that in the Gospels is the indication in John's Gospel that 'the disciple whom Jesus loved' was the source of what is written in that Gospel (John 21:24) but the Gospel never identifies who the beloved disciple is.

The first and the last of the Gospels to be written begin with the start of the public life of Jesus. It is only in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke that we have the infancy narratives and the narrative they put before us differs one from the other. But all they wrote was designed to help us to believe 'that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God and that believing this we may have life in his name'.
