

FATHER LIAM SAYS: A parish – like a pilgrimage – is a group of people who travel, supporting one another. WE are on our way to meet the Child. We are like the Wise Men who followed a star – one small light in he cosmos – on the first Christmas pilgrimage. We have our own little lights on the Advent wreath. The circle is an age-old symbol for eternity – a ring has no end. So the circle reminds us that God has no beginning and no end. The evergreens stand for eternal life – evergreens don't die in the winter. Green is the colour of hope. The evergreen branches stand as God's promise to us that we too are evergreen. We will not die. Christ assures us that 'those who believe in me will never die'.

The Advent wreath is a reminder to us also that there is work to be done. Three of the candles are purple – purple is the Church's colour of renewal. The task of renewal is a constant one. The Church puts on the purple apron when it is getting her home ready. It is getting ready for the coming of the Saviour. His first coming is symbolised on the wreath by the white candle. Christ is the centre of all things. As the Word of God he existed from all eternity and through him all things were made. We prepare to welcome him into our world as one of us. He became one of our human family and pitched his tent among us. Our rose-coloured candle reminds us that we should work with joy to welcome him. The Advent wreath tells an extraordinary story – the meaning of existence, in a way, culminating not in doom and gloom but in triumph when the glory of Christ is fully revealed and all mankind will share his triumph. On the Sundays of Advent one light after another has been lit each week. It reminds us that we must search more earnestly for him as his coming among us draws near. This year Christmas Eve is on a Friday with Mass at 6.00 pm and also at 9.00 pm, which takes the place of Midnight Mass. Christmas was the only time when there was a Midnight Mass. It was the reason, some say, why the feast became known as Christmas. In most countries Christmas is known by a name derived from 'Birth'. The liturgical name for Christmas is 'The Nativity of the Lord'. Nowel has that connotation, of course, in French.

The name Christmas came into use in England in the Middle Ages, not only because of Midnight Mass but because it became customary for priests to say three Masses on the Feast. It was highly unusual to be allowed to say three Masses on one day. After World War I priests were allowed to say three Masses on 2nd November to pray for all throughout the world who lost their lives as a result of that disaster, including the victims of the 'Spanish Flu'.

This year Christmas Day will be followed immediately by Sunday, which is observed as the Feast of the Holy Family. Some people might think that it is overdoing it to expect people to come to Mass on Saturday and again on Sunday. Why not one Mass to cover both days? It is because the Feast of Christmas is special and because Sunday is special.
