FATHER LIAM SAYS: How do we see ourselves in the Church? What is your idea of 'church'? What is distinctive about us? What has God got to say about us? The pictures that the scriptures give us of who we are as church are many and precious. So many of them come from Christ himself. He tells us that we belong to him as intimately as sheep belong to their shepherd. He speaks of the union that exists between us and him is like the union between a vine and its branches. We draw our strength from the vine and we are meant to share our strength and vitality and life with one another. We must never imagine that we are alone. We belong. A powerfully grounded scriptural image of the Church that has been emphasised over the past sixty years — ever since the Second Vatican Council — is that we are the pilgrim people of God. We are on a journey together. Jesus leads us on that journey. He speaks to us of his plans for us and he nourishes us with his word and his living presence with us.

Pope Francis has been encouraging us to dwell on these great realities by inviting us to take part in this synodal pathway. Synod means walking together. Our whole purpose is summed up in that word. We are pilgrims. We are travellers. Unity happens when we walk together. We have a destination and a purpose. We are called to look out for one another and support and encourage one another. Above all we are called to recognise Jesus as the one who calls us together and forms us into his people. He, the Son of God, became one of us to lead us in the task of building a world of justice, love and peace and his great joy is to share his love and peace with us for all eternity.

This particular synodal pathway started back in October when Catholics throughout the world were invited to embark on this exercise of prayer and reflection and consultation and will reach an important stage in October next year when the reflections gleaned from the participants all over the world will form the subject matter of the 2023 Synod and we are all invited to participate. Our manner of participation has not been as thorough as it might have been. We have been constrained by the virus but apart from that it would have been difficult for many people to get enthused amid the various concerns with which we have to cope.

Synods have been a feature of the Church on a regular basis for the past sixty years or so but this is one that has received by far the greatest publicity and the one that we are all encouraged to be involved in. Pope Francis proposes that this synodal pathway should be characterised by three considerations: Communion, Participation and Mission. Communion: we are brothers and sisters in the Lord, all equally children of God, uniquely loved by him. We are called upon to gather around the Table of the Lord to participate in the Eucharistic banquet together. We listen together as God speaks to us when the scriptures are spoken to us.

Participation: We are called to be actively involved in the life of the parish. We are a community and community depends on its members playing their part. We all have our own various talents and gifts to contribute to the vitality of our local church community. We have been emphasising in recent Newsletters how much we need more volunteers in all kinds of areas: Readers, Children's Liturgy, Flower Arranging. We need people to prepare the money for banking and to bank it each week. There is no one, only me, who has been doing this for the past year or more. Those who were doing it are over 80 and so not covered by insurance. I am running out of time myself! Singers, musicians, people with expertise in building and maintenance, arts and crafts, welcomers at Sunday Masses and for church visitors – we need the gifts of one and all to keep going. St Paul emphasises all this so powerfully in today's Second Reading.

Mission: The Good News must be spread, and we are all commissioned to spread it. We are called to speak about the things of God to others. We have been entrusted with a great message, not a secret. The means of communication are ever expanding. But Christ needs messengers. Please remember to respond to the Questionnaires.
