FATHER LIAM SAYS: The world has been knocked sideways by the Pandemic, which has not yet run it's course, and by the murderous aggression waged by Russia against Ukraine. These major crises understandably have tended to take our minds off the issue of climate change.

At the beginning of April, we had the latest Report from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC). It emphasised that the continued rise in greenhouse gas emissions must stop by 2025 at the latest and that a rapid and sustained reduction must follow, It warns that we have been wasting precious time in coming to grips with this environmental challenge. The whole world has known about the predicament facing us for many years but we continue to go in the wrong direction. The Report stresses that it is still possible to make up for lost time – but only if we take immediate and proportional measures. We have the knowledge and the technologies and finance to protect our planet; what we lack is the determination.

We have local elections this week and these are very important. In the case of parliamentary elections there are many constituencies where the outcome is totally predictable. Local elections are different and yet a pitiable proportion of the electorate vote. The policies adopted by local authorities greatly affects many aspects of our life and they have an influence on the quality and health of our environment. It is important that we vote wisely. We should make some effort to find out what the candidates seek to achieve by asking for our vote, what values impel them to seek public office? What precise causes do they seek to advance? The environment certainly is an important issue and one about which we should expect to learn what the policies of the various candidates are. This is not a party-political point but candidates surely should tell us what they intend to do with our vote. We all need to be more alert to the urgency of the problem. We need to make our views known to our political representatives at all levels and vote accordingly.

Between 1990 and 2019 there has been a 54% increase in emissions. We have to stop pumping greenhouse gases into the atmosphere. The goal of the Paris Agreement signed by 193 countries is to limit global warming to well below 2 – preferably 1.5 – degrees Celsius compared to pre-industrial temperature levels. The Report says that 'we are at a crossroads. The decisions we make now can secure a liveable future.'

A quick look back to a highlight of the magnificent Easter Vigil ceremonies. The Easter Proclamation (called in Latin Exultet) is a wonderful hymn of praise at the beginning of the Easter Vigil. It beautifully tells us how the Jewish Passover event marking the freedom of the people of Israel from slavery in Egypt is fulfilled in Christ's work of salvation when in his Resurrection he triumphed over suffering and death and won Redemption for the whole human race. It celebrates the triumph of the Israelites of old and the even greater triumph won by Christ for all of us when he achieved his great Passover for us and for our salvation.

This greatest of Easter hymns proclaims: 'This is the night when once you led our forebears, Israel's children from slavery in Egypt and made them pass dry-shod through the Red Sea... This is the night when Christ broke the prison bars of death and rose victorious from the underworld. But it was not the Red Sea at all that Israel's children crossed. The Hebrew phrase means 'The Sea of Reeds'. Somehow it has got changed in translation to the Red Sea. Most modern translations of the Bible speak of the Sea of Reeds. The words of the Psalms that we use in the Mass is the version translated from the Hebrew by the Grail and it speaks of the Red Sea. The text of the Exultet and other prayers of the liturgy follow suit. But the Hebrews never went near the Red Sea during the Exodus. And those who penned the scripture never said they did! It was some of the translators who got it wrong.

But where exactly is The Sea of Reeds? Some scholars think it is the Gulf of Suez, others the Gulf of Aqaba, others a lagoon in the Nile Delta. But it is better not to know the answer than to know the wrong answer!
