FATHER LIAM SAYS: Thank you once again for making my recent birthday so memorable. I would like to refer in particular to the gift of Trees for the Holy Land to mark the occasion. The Motto of the charity 'Trees for the Holy Land' is 'Give trees – Give life'. They are dedicated to the reforestation of the Holy Land. Over 250 million trees have been planted in Israel during the last century. Israel is the only country in the world to complete the 20th century with a net gain of trees. Their vision as an organisation is to celebrate life. This is the message of 'Trees for the Holy Land'. 'Our mission is to help people rejoice and to commemorate in a most special way while working to green the Holy Land of Israel one tree at a time'. So thanks to your kindness and thoughtfulness a grove of twenty-five trees has been planted in the Holy Land. The saplings are between one and two years old and a height of approximately twenty-four inches.

Much of the natural vegetation of the Holy Land had disappeared or had been destroyed by the time reforestation efforts had begun over 100 years ago. The Bible was the source of knowledge of which species were native to the Holy Land. The original trees were olive, oak, pine, cypress, tamarisk, palm, acacia and carob. These are the species that are now being planted to replenish and nurture the Holy Land. Current reforestation efforts in Israel are in three places. 1) the mountainous slopes in Galilee, 2) the Negev Desert and 3) in urban areas for beautification and recreational parks. The trees that you have provided have been placed where they are most needed, in the environment that is most conducive for their growth. The wish for all of us and our loved ones is 'May you be blessed and may you grow strong and tall in your life'. Thank you for enabling 'Trees for the Holy Land to do their work. Our best wishes today go to David and Theresa Steadman on their Diamond Jubilee of their marriage and to Father John Nuttall on the Golden Jubilee of his ordination. We are so grateful to him for helping out. I will try to keep going, if he keeps coming!

The last chapter of St Paul's letter to the Romans gives us quite a list of women and men involved in the life of the Christian community in Rome. Heading that list is 'our sister Phoebe, deacon of the Church at Cenchreae. Give her in the Lord a welcome worthy of the saints and help her with whatever she needs from you – she herself has been a great help to many people, including me'. (16:1-2) Cenchreae was a port near Corinth from which Paul wrote this letter and Phoebe was probably the person who brought the letter to Rome. Paul says:' I would like you to welcome her'. His commendation of Phoebe is an important indication of the leadership role exercised by women in the early Christian communities. He calls her 'a deacon of the Church in Cenchreae'. The translation 'deaconess' that is sometimes used is not correct. Paul uses the masculine form of the word 'diakonos'. At the time there was no feminine form – it had not yet evolved. An order of 'diaconal' women arose in the third century. So in the case of Phoebe there is no question of any distinction of duties based on gender.

We cannot read into the term all the features attaching to the order of the deaconate in the later Church. But the description does imply that Phoebe exercised the office of service in a continuing and recognised capacity. The precise role of deacons in the first century Church communities is uncertain but the title does signify to the Roman community that the bearer of the letter is someone of stature within the Church. Paul says of her that 'she has been a great help to many people including me'. The Greek word Paul used for 'great help' means a patron or sponsor of some kind. Paul certainly views her as a co-worker of his. The reference to Phoebe in the first two verses of Romans, chapter 16 is never read at Mass. Some of the names in Romans feature on a weekday Mass every two years but not that of the deacon Phoebe. Perhaps that speaks for itself. Phoebe is a little known saint whose feast day falls on 3rd September.

In Chapter 16 of Romans we hear of women who were in positions of leadership in local churches – Phoebe, Priscilla, Junia, Mary, Tryfhosa and Parsis. Ten of the twenty-four people we know from this chapter are women, with or without reference to a man who is husband, father or son. The list only hints at the significance of each woman mentioned. We would like to know more but it is Important that we treasure what Paul tells us. The very early Church does not appear to be quite so male-dominated as it has become. We have again begun to realise the importance of greater involvement of all the baptised. May God speed!
