FATHER LIAM SAYS: This summer many of us will have heard the tune 'Jerusalem' played more often in the course of 10 days than ever before. It was played every time an English athlete won gold at the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham. English winners of gold medals at the European Games in Glasgow shortly afterwards were heralded by the playing of 'God save the Queen', which would not have been appropriate for any winner in the Commonwealth setting.

The composer of the tune was Sir Hubert Parry, who in 1916 set the words of William Blake's poem, 'And did those feet', to music. The Poet Laureate, Robert Bridges, commissioned Parry to set the poem of four stanzas to music. Blake had written the words about a century earlier and the poem by then had almost been forgotten. Bridges hoped that it would raise morale during the Great War. Ever since it has been firmly established as a patriotic hymn.

William Blake was born in London in 1757, the son of an Irish hosier. At the age of 14 he was apprenticed to an engraver and went on to study at the Royal Academy School. His first book of poems appeared in 1783. He produced a number of illustrated books of poetry using engraved copper plates, though he met with little acknowledgement. He had a deep Christian faith and felt guided by visitations from the spiritual world.

What did Blake have in mind when he wrote:

'And did those feet in ancient times, walk upon England's mountains green?'

According to the late Victorian legend, Joseph of Arimathea brought the boy Jesus – his nephew – to England as he travelled widely, trading for tin. Blake did not know of this myth as it was invented more than half a century after Blake's death in 1827. But he was aware of a much older story that Joseph had come to Britain with 12 followers and established the first Christian church at Glastonbury. A twelfth century book 'The Ancient Church of Glastonbury' was tampered with by an anonymous editor much later who inserted this tale of Joseph into the book. He was eager to establish the primacy of Glastonbury Abbey over the Abbey of Westminster. John Milton, the author of 'Paradise Lost' wrote a book 'The History of Britain'. In it he says that Joseph of Arimathea was 'said to have preached the Christian faith in this land'

Milton, who was a supporter of Oliver Cromwell, was extremely anti-Catholic. Protestant writers ever since the time of Elizabeth I's reign had been searching for an alternative version of how Christianity came to England. They were not happy with the account that St. Augustine had been the first to plant the faith in the South of England. St Augustine had, of course, been sent by Pope Gregory the Great to Kent with a company of 40 monks from a monastery in Rome. When the Church of England broke from Rome there was an effort to foster the legend that there was indeed a non-Roman source for the Church of England and that source was Joseph and his band of followers. John Milton's history did much to propagate this view. Blake too was not kindly disposed towards Catholics but was much less so than Milton. In his poem he asks four questions, the answer to each of which is 'no'. This is one reason why it is not particularly suitable to be sung at a wedding!
