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

FATHER LIAM SAYS: Some years ago the book 'Roots' was serialised on television. The author, Alex Haley, researched the history of his family, working on the stories his grandmother had told him as a child. Haley, an American, was able to find out when an ancestor of his had been taken from his village in Africa and kidnapped by slave-traders. From the records of slave ships Haley was able to determine from what part of Africa his ancestors may have been taken. Travelling there, Haley met with the descendants of those who had lived in that village and the storyteller chanted their history from memory. He told of a young man, Kunta Kinte, who had gone out of the village one day to collect wood and never returned. Haley told the villagers, from the stories that he had heard from his grandmother, what had happened to that young man and that he was his descendant. The community welcomed Haley as one who had finally come home. Every Sunday our Catholic community gathers to hear our story. The book from which that story is read is carried with reverence and respect. We prepare to hear our story with singing and silence and prayer. Our story begins with the Jewish people. Their traditions and ours are told in legends and histories, laws, letters, parables and songs. Whatever form they take those scriptures tell the story of a God who made and loved us and how he chose a people who could reveal to all who God is. The words of this book are God's message of love to us. We sit down and the reader begins and the Church is nourished at the table of God's Word. Two tables are set before us, the table of the Word and the table of the Eucharist. On Sundays three scripture readings are proclaimed. The first is usually from the oldest books of the Bible – the Hebrew scriptures. The second is normally from one of the letters of the New Testament and the third is from one of the Gospels. As a people we travel through the centuries. The other Christian churches journey with much the same book. Jews carry a book that contains most of these same scriptures and they have carried it much longer. Most of the Christian scriptures are in fact a Jewish book.

Through the course of three years the book is opened on Sundays to many parts of this collection of various smaller books. The Bible literally means 'Books'. It is, in fact, a small library but the most precious of all of them. In the course of three years the Sunday readings open up much of the scriptures to us. The readings are not simply for our information. They are what gives the Church its nourishment and life. They were, of course, written over two thousand years ago – some much longer – and in very different places and civilisations. They were written under divine inspiration but in the language and idiom of their own time and place. We shouldn't be too surprised then when we find some of what is read to us difficult to understand. The Old Testament was the only scriptures that existed in the lifetime of Jesus. The New Testament was written after his Resurrection and the more we are familiar with the Old Testament the clearer we see how the New Testament fulfils it.

The high point of the Liturgy of the Word is the proclamation of the Gospel. The whole congregation stands and begins to sing, usually at any rate, Alleluia. Candles and incense sometimes accompany the Book of the Gospels. When the text is announced we respond: 'Glory to you Lord' and we sign our foreheads, lips and heart with the sign of the cross. In this way we pray that the gospel may fill our minds, form our words and change our hearts. The homily follows and the Liturgy of the Word concludes with prayers of intercession. Christ's followers have been doing this at Sunday Mass for a vey long time. It is a delight to hear St Justin the Martyr describe what Christians did in his day. He wrote this account in the year 155 to the pagan Emperor Antoninus who was persecuting the Church: "On the day of the sun all who live in cities or in the country gather together in the same place and the memoirs of the Apostles and the writings of the prophets are read, as long as time permits. Then when the reader has ended, the one who presides instructs and exhorts all to imitate the good things just read. After this we all rise together and offer prayers for ourselves and for all others wherever they may be so that we may be found righteous by our life and actions and faithful to the commandments so as to obtain eternal salvation.' He goes on in the letter to tell the emperor what they do next! Like them we too move from the Liturgy of the Word to the Liturgy of the Eucharist.
