FATHER LIAM SAYS: The Church throughout the world has been involved in the process of synodality for the past few years. It is due to come to a significant stage in October of this year and a more decisive and definitive position in October 2024. From all the effort that continues to be put into it, this Synod of the Church is indeed a major undertaking, the most important event in the life of the Church since the Second Vatican Council which was concluded nearly 60 years ago. The concluding stage of the Synod, which will take place in Rome, will coincide with the 60tht Anniversary the conclusion of the Vatican Council.

Synodality means 'journeying together'. There was an effort to involve the whole Church in this search to discern the call of the Gospel for us today. This effort met with a mixed response. Covid didn't help and the level of enthusiasm for the exercise varied from place to place. Nevertheless, it was a significant opportunity for the Church at parish level throughout the world to prayerfully consider how we could more faithfully be the Church Christ is calling us to be. The Church has embarked on this journey with hope and with conviction that it is a necessary journey. The Church is always in need of renewal and strengthening in its mission to proclaim and live the Good News. At the present time this need is particularly evident, which is why Pope Francis is investing such time and effort into ensuring that the Church measures up to Christ's call. Vatican II has been probably the most significant event in the history of Catholicism since the Protestant Reformation. The discussions and documents of the Council ushered in significant changes that inspired and sustained renewal in the life of the Church. It gave us a new appreciation of the centrality of the scriptures and a renewed liturgy. Fewer and fewer people can remember how Mass was celebrated up to sixty years ago – in Latin and with the priest with his back to the people. Perhaps in 60 years from now, people who are now infants will look back in amazement at some of the structures and practices of the Church of today.

But Vatican II generated tensions and disagreements not unlike those we are witnessing now with regard to synodality. Perhaps we can learn from past controversies to enable us to deal with the tensions in today's Church! Change must happen. The Church has always been changing yet it has maintained unity and continuity over two thousand years. To live is to change. There were very many lively debates at Vatican II especially on subjects such as the liturgy and religious freedom. Many prominent Cardinals and Bishops were opposed to recognising people's right to religious freedom. They held that everyone – including the State – had an obligation to promote truth and to limit error. And to their way of thinking truth was to be found in the Catholic Church and its teachings. This was known as the 'Rights of Truth'. They held that error had no Rights. Religious freedom, some sincerely believed, could only be claimed by the Catholic Church. The vast majority of the bishops promoted religious freedom as a human right. People cannot be coerced into truth. It must be freely embraced. Religious freedom is now proclaimed as the most important of Rights, inseparable from human dignity. Can similar progress be chieved with regard to some of the disputed questions facing the Church of today? It has moved from a 'Rights of truth' approach to a 'Rights of the person' approach in the area of religious freedom. Is a similar shift of understanding needed in terms of understanding the nature and richness of human relationships. Does current Church teaching on sexuality adequately honour the richness and variety of expressions of human love, companionship and family. Pope Francis in his document 'Amoris Laeitia' (The Joy of Love) engaged with some of these controversial issues. He called for greater appreciation of the complexity of people's lives - 'a need to avoid judgements which do not take into account the complexity of various situations.' He calls for a greater appreciation of the sacredness of conscience and the pastoral responsibility 'to form consciences, not to replace them'. He says we must have a keener appreciation of God's mercy - 'mercy is the fullness of justice and the most radiant manifestation of God's truth. For this reason we should always consider inadequate any theological conception which in the end puts in doubt the omnipotence of God and especially his mercy.'

The Synodal path is a courageous journey. we should pray for its success. We are pilgrims. Journeying is what we were made for. Christ has come to accompany us. Let us not be afraid.
