FATHER LIAM SAYS: The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord brings the Christmas season to an end. The Solemnity of the Epiphany, which we celebrated on Friday, led us to reflect on the mission of the Lord to bring salvation to all nations. Today's Feast marks the beginning of that mission as Jesus begins his public ministry. The Spirit of God descended like a dove on him and a voice from heaven revealed: 'This is my Son, the Beloved, in whom I am well pleased.'

We tend to think that Jesus in his public life was surrounded by a group of men consisting primarily of the twelve apostles. But at the very end of Mark's gospel – the first to be written – we are told 'that a large group of women who were with him in Galilee had accompanied him to Jerusalem and to Calvary.' Among them were Mary of Magdala, Mary, who was the mother of James the younger, and Joset and Salome. These used to follow him and look after him when he was in Galilee and many other women were there who had come up to Jerusalem with him'. (Ch 15:40-41) The presence of these women might prompt us to ask what was their role. Should we assume it was any different from that of the men. As we listen to the gospel readings Sunday by Sunday we must not imagine Jesus on the road with twelve men alone accompanying him. There is a large mixed group of women as well as men.

We also tend to think that the spread of Christianity after the Resurrection was something accomplished by men assisted, of course, by the Holy Spirit. The role of St Peter and St Paul is especially emphasised. We call St Paul the Apostle of the Gentiles, because he brought the gospel to the non-Jewish world while Peter's early ministry was devoted to leading those of the Jewish faith to Christ. But what of the role of women? Paul himself, in his letters mentions many women by name who worked with him in spreading the gospel message. His longest and perhaps most significant letter was written to the Romans. At this stage he had not been to Rome but intended going there. He wrote his letter to the Romans as a way of introducing himself to the Christian community there. Paul knew quite a few Christians there. Rome was the centre of a great empire so people were coming and going to Rome in a big way. In his letter he sends greetings to 26 people by name. Paul had worked with them in various other places. Peter at this time had not come to Rome either. There were a number of Christian communities in Rome but, of course, they hd no church buildings. This letter is always the first of Paul's letters listed in the bible. This is because it is the longest. he wrote it before the year 60 AD – more than 5 years before he himself came to Rome. When he did come to Rome it was to defend himself and his message and he lived under house arrest until his martyrdom by beheading in the year 66.

This letter is proclaimed more often than any of {Paul's letters in our Sunday Mass. This is a passage which is never read at Mass but it throws a lot of light on how the early Church was organised and on who did the organising. This is how he begins the last chapter – chapter 16 – of his letter. The first person he mentions is Phoebe, to whom he has trusted this letter and who delivered it to the Christians in Rome. Cenchreae is near Corinth.

- 1. I would like you to welcome our sister Phoebe. She is a deacon of the church in Cenchreae.
- 2. I ask you to receive her as one who belongs to the Lord. Receive her in the way God's people should. Give her any help she may need from you. She has been a great help to many people, including me.
- 3. Greet Priscilla and Aquila. They work together with me in serving Christ Jesus.
- 4. They have put their lives in danger for me. I am thankful for them. So are all the Gentile churches.
- 5. Greet also the church that meets in the house of Priscilla and Aquila. Greet my dear friend Epenetus. He was the first person in Asia Minor to become a believer in Christ.
- 6. Greet Mary. She worked very hard for you.
- 7. Greet Andronicus and Junia, my fellow Jews. They have been in prison with me. They are leaders among the apostles. They became believers in Christ before I did.
- 8. Greet Ampliatus, my dear friend in the Lord.
- 9. Greet Urbanus. He works together with me in serving Christ. And greet my dear friend Stackys.
- 10. Greet Apelles. he remained faithful to Christ even when he was tested. Greet those who live at the house of Aristobulus.
- 11. Greet Herodiion, my fellow Jew. Greet the believers who live in the house of Narcissus.
- 12. Greet Tryphena and Tryphosa. Those women work hard for the Lord. Greet my dear friend Persis. She is another woman who has worked very hard for the Lord.
- 13. Greet Rufus. He is a chosen believer in the Lord. And greet his mother. She has been like a mother to me too.
- 14. Greet Asyncritus, Phlegon and Hermes. Greet Patrobas, Hermas and the other brothers and sisters with them.
- 15. Greet Philologus, Julia and his sister. Greet Olympas and all of the Lord's people who are with them.
- 16. Greet one another with a holy kiss. All the churches of Christ send their greetings

In this passage there are 10 women mentioned by name as active

promoters of the gospel. There are at least five homes which serve as houses where Christians meet. The women mentioned are Phoebe, Priscilla, Mary, Junia, Tryphosa, Tryphena, Persis and the mother of Rufus, Julia and the sister of Nerius.

It is interesting that Priscilla and her husband Aquila are mentioned four times in the New Testament and in each case Priscilla is named before her husband. In verse 7 Junia is called with her husband 'leaders among the apostles'. St John Chrysostom, who died in 407 had this to say: 'To be an apostle is something great. But to be outstanding among the apostles, just think what a wondrous song of praise that is. Truly how great the wisdom of this woman that she was deemed worthy of the title apostle'.
