FATHER LIAM SAYS: It is now almost three years since we had the first COVID lockdown. The Covid 19 virus is still with us along with other seasonal viruses. Many people have had three or four doses of the vaccine but the risk of infection still exists. The Bishops of England and Wales propose that we continue for a few more weeks to receive Holy Communion only under the appearance of bread until the end of this winter season and its associated viruses. They suggest that a suitable time to resume Holy Communion under both species would be the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday, which is on 6th April.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper is an extraordinarily significant celebration marking the institution of the Eucharist. At that Mass we have the first biblical account of that event – from St Paul who was writing before any of the gospels were written: 'For the tradition I received from the Lord and also handed on to you, is that on the night he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took a loaf of bread and after he had given thanks, he broke it and said 'This is my body which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me. And in the same way, with the cup after the supper, saying 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it do this in remembrance of me.' As often as you eat this bread, then, and drink this cup you are proclaiming the Lord's death until he comes.' For the entire lifetime of many of us we have been able to receive Holy Communion in the same way as the disciples who were gathered around the table with Jesus, received it and as his disciples, continued to receive it for hundreds of years. For Christians in the West reception from the chalice ceased to be the practice some time before the Reformation. But the chalice was restored after the Second Vatican Council.

I the early Church people brought various gifts with them to Sunday mass, many of which would be shared afterwards with the poor. Among the loaves of bread offered, some were chosen to be used – together with some wine – at the table of the eucharist. Over time the form of the bread used has changed. The practice of sharing a loaf was abandoned and precut round 'breads' are used. So the symbolism of sharing in the common loaf was weakened and sharing in the common cup was discontinued.

Evidence of the earlier approach have been discovered in a number of place. In the National Museum of Dublin there is the Derrynaflan chalice and plate, which had long been buried underground in the times of Viking attacks, especially on monasteries. The communion-plate, or paten, is a good sized dinner plate 36 cm in diameter. The measurement shows that it was used for holding and breaking a loaf as part of the actual celebration. Textual evidence informs us that on occasion it could be broken into about 70 pieces. Turning to the chalice, we find that the shape is evidently suitable for it to be passed around to a sizeable number of people. It has handles for giving and taking with ease and without danger of spillage. It could hold just under 1.5 litres of wine quite safely and would fit well with the number of communicants that the paten could accommodate. The chalice and paten were made of precious materials and elaborately decorated.

All this took time and special chants were sung while people received. The triple repetition of the 'Lamb of God' is a remnant of what people sang during Communion time. A number of medieval chants have been found that would have accompanied the action of receiving the Eucharist from the paten and the chalice. They are particularly suitable for Eastertide and Corpus Christi and every line is taken from scripture. This is a brief example – in translation:

'O Lord, we believe that in this breaking of your body and pouring out of your blood we become your redeemed people. We confess that in taking the gifts of this pledge here we lay hold in hope of enjoying its true fruits in the heavenly places.'
