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

FATHER LIAM SAYS: We come together on Sundays to do what Christ invited us to do. On the night before he died he celebrated the Last Supper with his disciples. It was clearly a very special meal that he wished to be perpetuated for all time. Gathering his friends around him at table in this special way was not to be reserved for his first followers bur an event that his followers of all time and in every place were meant to celebrate. He told those with him at the Last Supper that they were to continue to do what he had done with them and for all.

The first name which his followers gave to this definitive action of Jesus was 'the breaking of bread'. In all four accounts that the New Testament gives us of that special meal we are told that Jesus took the bread, blessed and broke it and gave it to his disciples. We are told in the Acts of the Apostles how after the Resurrection, Christ's followers gathered in each other's houses for the breaking of bread. Before it was known as the Eucharist or the Lord's Supper it was called the breaking of bread. It was called the Eucharist, which is a Greek word for praise and thanksgiving because Jesus spoke the prayer of praise and thanksgiving over the bread and over the cup of wine, which he shared with his disciples. This was the first Eucharistic Prayer and the first Eucharist.

St Paul was the first follower of Christ to write anything that is part of the New Testament. His letters were written before any of the gospels, so Paul is the first to write about what happened at that Last Supper though, of course, he was not present, nor was he a believer in Christ until some years after Christ's Resurrection. In his first letter to the Corinthians, he speaks of the profound bonding with Jesus and with one another that takes place when we celebrate the Eucharist. 'The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a sharing in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a sharing in the body of Christ? Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, foe we all partake of the one bread.' (10: 16,17) What is meant by 'one bread' is 'one loaf' and that is how it is sometimes translated. The use of little particles such as we have was a much later and poorer development. The one loaf was a powerful symbol of Christ's unity with us and our unity with one another.

The Second Vatican Council, which issued its great document on the Liturgy sixty years ago encouraged the Church to return to that original practice and to use bread at the Eucharist that looked and tasted like bread. The liturgy was the first topic that the Council worked on. The 2,000 or so bishops present voted almost unanimously for this document but when they went back to their dioceses they scarcely did a thing to encourage us to bring a loaf to the table of the Lord! How many people today, even know that such an idea was ever discussed at the great Council of the Church?

Did the apostles who took part in the Last Supper understand the meaning of the words and actions of Jesus as he blessed the bread and wine, saying that they were truly his body and blood? Perhaps their understanding was very partial. the meaning would be clearer to them after the Resurrection. But their understanding would continue to grow until they achieved the light of glory in heaven. He had spoken to them of this great mystery in the course of his public ministry. St John in Chapter 6 of his gospel gives us some of this great eucharistic teaching, which they would have lovingly reflected on throughout their ministry. This is what we too are called to do.

At Mass, when bread and wine are brought to the altar, we are invited to stand and to lift up our hearts as together with Christ 'we give thanks to the Lord our God'. Giving God perfect thanks and praise is what the Eucharist enables us to do, because it is Christ's great act of worship of the Father that we are privileged to participate in. And we participate in the Eucharist in the same way that St Justin the Martyr wrote about nearly 1,900 years ago: 'When the prayers (of intercession) are concluded, bread and a cup of wine mixed with water are brought to him who presides over the brethren. He takes them and offers praise ad glory to the Father of the Universe, through the name of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and for a considerable time he gives thanks (Eucharistian) that we have been judged worthy of these gifts. When he has concluded the prayers and thanksgiving all present give voice to an acclamation, by saying 'Amen'. When he who presides has given thanks and the people have responded, those who we call deacons give to those present the eucharisted bread and wine and take them to those who are absent.' We look forward to having the opportunity once again to receive from the chalice as Jesus invited us to do.
