FATHER LIAM SAYS: Easter is the oldest and most solemn of all the Christian feasts because it is the great celebration of the Resurrection of Christ. It is also called the Pasch or the Passover after the Jewish feast commemorating the setting free of the people of Israel from the slavery in Egypt. The deliverance of the Jews foreshadowed the Christian Passover. It was at Christ's last celebration of the Passover on the night before he died that he instituted the Eucharist, the last act before he laid down his life for us.

Other feasts of the Church's year depend upon the date of Easter, which occurs on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the Spring Equinox. So the date of Easter varies from year to year, unlike Christmas and the feasts associated with it, which have a fixed date. The Church considers each Sunday of the year to be a continuation of Easter. Sunday is the Lord's Day. Its name in Latin is Dominica, which derived from Dominus, meaning Lord. In the early centuries the only feast that the Church observed was Easter and every Sunday was celebrated as 'little Easter.'

The importance of Easter is emphasised liturgically by the long preparation of Lent leading to the special ceremonies of Holy Week as well as by the whole Easter Season which runs until Pentecost Sunday. Pentecost is a word that refers to the fiftieth day. The Jewish feast of Pentecost is celebrated fifty days after the Jewish Passover and we celebrate the Christian feast of Pentecost as the concluding celebration of Eastertide.

The characteristic features of Easter and the entire season is the Pascal Candle and the frequent repetition of 'Alleluia', the chant of joy and victory at Christ's Redemption. In the words of St Augustine, 1,600 years ago: 'We are an Easter people and Alleluia is our song'. The Easter Candle is lit on every Sunday Mass during the fifty days of the Easter Season celebrating the Risen Christ.

The high point of the Easter celebration is the Easter Vigil, which takes place after sunset on Holy Saturday. In Jewish reckoning, a new day begins at sunset. The Jewish Sabbath therefore would end at sunset and the first day of the week would begin. The gospel of St John tells us that 'early on the first day of the week, when it was still dark, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb and she saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb'. (20:1). That is why our Easter celebrations begin after sunset – and we are urged to gather outside, around a fire. This again is connected with Jewish ritual. The lighting of the fire is a Christian version of an ancient Jewish 'Lighting of the Lamps' that took (and takes) place on the eve of the Sabbath. It initiated the Sabbath celebration that was celebrated in the home. The head of the family blessed God for the gift of light. The light we come to celebrate is Christ the Light of the World, who by his passage from death to life has overcome the power of darkness and turns the night into day, in the words of the great Easter hymn, The Exultet.

The Christians originally met in darkness for the celebration of the Sunday Masses. Christianity was outlawed in the Roman Empire and Sunday was a working day. Many of the first Christians came to the faith from Judaism and cherished their sacred Jewish customs so they continued to start their Eucharist with a ceremonial fire. From the fire they would light the candles which illuminated their place of worship. This fire, therefore, had a symbolic and practical purpose. And the Paschal fire too links us with our Jewish past. Christ's birth, life, death and Resurrection were never meant to be seen as a break with the past but as its fulfilment and culmination. It is because of this that the Church in its liturgy from the beginning has clung to the Jewish words of joy and celebration – Amen! Alleluia! Hosannah! The Easter Candle that is such a feature, not only of our Easter ceremonies but also of our baptismal and funeral ceremonies, is also a reminder of the pillar of fire that accompanied the Israelites on their long and anxious journey to the promised land. The candle has reminders on it of the wounds our Saviour suffered. Each year is marked on the candle asking Christ to strengthen us as we travel. The candle carries the Alpha and the Omega – the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. These are the divine titles given to Christ in the Letter to the Hebrews and in the Book of Revelation

proclaiming that Jesus is the Christ, yesterday and today, the Beginning and the End.
