FATHER LIAM SAYS: This Month we mark the sixtieth anniversary of the death of Pope John XXIII. He died in June 1963 after the shortest pontificate for two centuries. In September 1978, Pope John Paul I died after a mere 33 days to be followed by Pope John Paul II, who occupied the Chair of Peter for 27 years.

Pope John XXIII was elected Pope in October 1958, less than a month short of his seventy-seventh birthday. In the following January he announced his intention of convening a General Council of the Church. Pope John, from the beginning, gave the clear impression of a man in a hurry. He wanted to change the Church and he was determined that the papacy itself had to change. He wanted to put an end to Papal dictatorship and to promote a collegiate spirit in the Church where leadership was to be shared in a much greater way with the bishops of the Church throughout the world. So the Second Vatican Council came about – the 21st General Council of the Church. The First Vatican Council had been held about 80 years earlier'. Its most notable achievement was to emphasise the pre-eminence of the papacy but did not have the opportunity to set it into the context of its relationship to the role of the bishops. Unrest and warfare in Europe caused the Council to be prematurely ended. Two World Wars took place before the Second Vatican Council was assembled in an effort to make the Church better equipped to do the task entrusted to it by Christ.

Only two of the 21 General Councils were held at the Vatican because it is only in recent centuries that the Pope lived at the Vatican. Throughout its history Popes had mainly lived in another part of Rome – the Lateran – and so many Councils were held there. In the first centuries the Councils of the Church were not held in Rome at all but in various Eastern cities such as Nicaea and Constantinople and Ephesus. Things have always been changing in the Church as well as everywhere else. And we are in the process of an unprecedented movement for change. The Councils of the Church mainly involved the Pope and bishops and their advisors. But now the Synod of the Church has been taking place. It is surely the greatest consultative effort in human history. It is widely seen as one of the most significant fruits of the Second Vatican Council.

Pope Francis, who became Pope at about the same age as did Pope John XXIII has also been a man in a hurry. He has clearly seen that the Church – now as always – is in great need of changing. Rather than depending on bishops, Pope Francis has embarked on an extraordinary attempt to listen to the voices of the world's 36 billion Catholics, nearly one fifth of all living people. A significant phase in this exercise will take place in Rome in October. The conclusion will take place in October 2024.

The Second Vatican Council reshaped the Catholic Church. It gave it a deeper self- understanding and encouraged it to be more outward looking and more focused on its missionary calling. There have been many Synods of Bishops since then designed to make us more alert to the promptings of the Holy Spirit in an ever changing world. 'Synod' literally means 'walking together'. This Synod of the Church is quite different. It aims, like the Second Vatican Council, to leave the life of the Church permanently changed. It focuses on discernment and listening and including the whole body of Catholics in ministry and decision making.

Participation has been patchy around different countries and diocese. The process of consultation in the first phase of the Synod was affected by the pandemic. Nevertheless, it seems that roughly 8-10% of Mass going Catholics engaged in the process. In the United States 700,000 took part. around 200,000 in France and 150,000 in England and Wales. Several themes have consistently emerged from the reports. In parishes throughout the world, Catholics have been calling for a more inclusive Church for women to have more visible leadership roles. For a very different relationship between the people and the priests who work with them in the parish and for new ways to be found to connect with younger generations. They want to see the model of God's people 'walking together' put into action and creating space for the guidance of the Holy Spirit at all levels of the Church.

National bodies have been producing reports and this has now moved on to the 'Continental' phase of the Synod. The Synod is an attempt to recover the spirit of the early Church. It is a process that is both old and new. It is a stepping-stone to a new way of being the Church. To be alive is to change.
