FATHER LIAM SAYS: I began my preparation for the priesthood in September 1960. The Second Vatican Council began two years later in October 1962 and came to a conclusion in December 1965. I was ordained in June 1966. The Council was in session for about three months each year from '62 – '65. when the bishops and their advisors were gathered in Rome. Much work was done on Council business for the rest of these years, when the bishops and their advisors were back in their Dioceses.

The fact that the Council was in session during much of the time that I was in the Seminary did not seem to impinge very much on our formation. Most of the lectures were the same as the various professors had been giving before the Council began. The documents from the Council took time to be produced and much longer to be digested, so the Seminary in my case was really a pre-Vatican II one.

In my 57 years as a priest, I have had the good fortune to experience the Vatican Council and its effects at grassroots level. During those years the Church was shepherded by Pope Paul VI, Pope John Paul I. Pope John Paul II, Pope benedict XVI and for the last ten years, by Pope Francis. May he be spared to guide us for a long time to come. The Liturgical changes ushered in in the wake of the Council have done much more than transform the way we celebrate Mass. They have brought about a remarkable change of atmosphere between the clergy and the people they minister to. A whole new spirit of partnership has been gradually growing over the years. It may have taken longer than would have been ideal but now we are much more conscious of what we were about, what being 'Church' means. And we are hopeful that in time the Synod of the Church will bring further blessings.

We must take seriously the assertion of the Council that the faithful who by Baptism are incorporated into Christ are the People of God and, in their own way, share the priestly, prophetic and kingly office of Christ and carry on the mission to the whole people in the Church and in the World. The great document of the Council is called Lumen Gentium, proclaiming Christ as the Light of the Nations. It also proclaims that all Christians in any state or walk of Life are called to the fullness of Christian life and to the perfection of love. The forms and tasks of life are many but 'holiness is one and is the calling of all'.

St Paul reassures us that 'you are God's chosen race, his Saints. He loves you. You should be clothed in sincere compassion, in kindness and humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with one another, forgive one another. Put on love. May the peace of Christ reign in your hearts. Always be thankful. Teach each other and advise each other in all wisdom. (Col. 3:12-16). We need to face the future with optimism and hope. The crowded churches of our youth concealed the fact that many churchgoers attended Mass through custom or through fear of sin. In some cases there was the pressure of public opinion to conform. Nowadays there may well be pressure exacted in the opposite direction. We need to remind ourselves that we are not just any bunch of people but a priestly people (1 Peter 2:5). We stand in the presence of the Father in union with our great High Priest, making intercessions for ourselves and the whole community of the baptised and all humanity. We are told, also by Peter, that we are a Kingly people united to Christ our King. He calls us to take responsibility for the welfare of one another and of the precious, fragile earth which he has provided for us and for all around us, as well as for those who come after us. We are loved and valued by the Lord and entrusted with vital responsibilities.
