**FATHER LIAM SAYS:** In past years priests were moved around quite a lot by their bishops. There were, of course, many more priests then than now and parishioners were affected by these clerical moves in different ways. Some would have cause to rejoice because they may not have seen eye to eye with a particular parish priest or assistant and they would have viewed this transfer as a liberation. Others might have been saddened because they might have grown to view their priest as a friend and support. There would have been a third group, in every parish, who would not be particularly affected at all. People were accustomed to the inevitability of the changing of the guard and adjusting to the fallout.

In my early years as a priest, the parish priest rarely retired. There were so many priests available that the senior curate would effectively step into the parish priest’s shoes when frailty overtook him. Retirement was not then in fashion for the clergy. I was an assistant priest for sixteen years before I became a parish priest at the age of forty. In Ireland at that time it was not at all uncommon for a priest to be sixty or over before becoming a parish priest. In that situation you could imagine that having waited so long for a parish he would be very reluctant to give it up – no matter how frail he might be.

In my sixteen years as an assistant priest or curate, I served in three parishes. I have been in this parish seventeen years already – by far the longest time I have been in any one parish and I hope the Lord will spare me the health – and you will afford me the tolerance – to carry on a while longer. In the very recent past, there was a category of parish priests recognised in Canon Law as irremovable. But Canon Law has been amended and elderly clergy are undefended! But the ecclesiastical landscape has been changed in far more drastic ways. The Annual Diocesan changes of clergy is now a very reduced affair. There are very few to be moved about.

Who would want to be a bishop in these days? There is a long agenda of difficult decisions to be made in every diocese and in every community. Bishop Richard – like all the bishops – is going around all the deaneries of the diocese, meeting representatives from all the parishes, listening to them and discussing with them the various possibilities. he is encouraging each parish to consider how best they can ensure that the life of the parish can not only survive but flourish in the next phase of its mission when more than one parish is served by one priest. Canon Law provides for this situation. After all, huge areas of the Church have never had the situation that we have had in much of Europe. They have had to organise themselves in different ways to live out their calling to be communities of faith.

Canon Law (Canon 517) says that pastoral care in a parish can be entrusted to a deacon or a designated lay person or a community of people. The leader, as the bishop’s delegate, would hold decision-making authority in the parish, always accountable to the bishop, through a designated priest, appointed to direct the pastoral care. transitions on this scale bring new challenges and opportunities. The people of the parish would have new possibilities to fulfil their baptismal calling and assume greater responsibility for the vitality of their community. Canon Law 231 states that there would be a duty to acquire suitable formation for their role and that they have a right to a worthy remuneration. There is a great need for forward pastoral planning. Raising awareness of the issues is important so as to at least remind one another that we must prepare spiritually and practically for a different vision of parish life.
