FATHER LIAM SAYS: A little child was born 2,000 years ago in a stable. Of the few who knew about it, most would have believed that this was just another poor child born into a poor family. The fact that this child was the Son of God was revealed to just a few – mainly a little group of shepherds.

When Jesus was preaching during his public ministry many people thought his teaching was wonderful and they listened to every word he said. Others thought that his teaching was dangerous and they plotted to get rid of him. When Peter, James and John accompanied him to the Mount of Transfiguration he was revealed to them as the Son of God. When Jesus was hanging on the Cross, he seemed to many to be just another convicted criminal. But the centurion who were standing there recognised him as someone entirely other than that. He declared: 'In truth, this man was the Son of God'.

We believe that God became one of us. Because of that we are temples of the Holy Spirit. Jesus is to be found and respected in every human being. At a funeral service we incense the coffin out of reverence for the body which was the temple of God during the person's life. We believe that we encounter God, not only in holy places but in every human being. Regardless of their origin, religion or how we feel about them.

Jesus spent much of his public life among those who were poor, befriending the unwanted. 'This man welcomes sinners and eats with them'. (Luke 15:1) This was seen as proof that he could not possibly be a true messenger of God. But being truly God, he recognised every human being as a child if God.

Some time ago we had a collection for the victims of the Syrian-Turkish earthquake. You donated the magnificent sum of £1,600 to their plight. During the Great Famine in Ireland the Ottoman Turks practically alone in all of Europe rallied to the aid of the starving people. They sent £200,000 in money and ten Turkish ships loaded with food broke a navy blockade to land at Drogheda. Their wish was to send more but were prevented by the government of the day who were embarrassed by the magnitude of the Turkish response in comparison to the measures they were taking. The Drogheda coat of arms to this day, bears the Crescent Moon and Star in honour of this noble stance. Recently Ireland sent 2 million euros and 100 tons of airlifted aid to help in their plight.

In God's family there are meant to be no strangers. February 2022 marked the renewed Russian incursion into Ukraine, when again you responded magnificently to the CAFOD appeals for assistance to the victims of the invasion. WE have been flying the Ukrainian fag from our Church flagpole for over a year. It faded and we flew another. Mysteriously, it was taken down just as we were about to replace it with the Union Flag on the occasion of the King's coronation. Its disappearance coincided with the local elections and the Barn was a Polling Station. Perhaps somebody felt that the wrong flag was flying! But we have now secured a new Ukrainian flag.

Every person is the presence of God to others. This is as true of refugees as of anybody else. AS Pope Francis said in his encyclical 'Fratelli Tutti': 'No one will ever openly deny that they (migrants) are human beings, yet in practice, by our own decisions and the way we treat them, we can show that we consider them less worthy, less important, less human. For Christians, this way of thinking and acting, is unacceptable, since it sets certain political preferences above deep convictions of our faith: the inalienable dignity of each human person regardless of origin, race or religion and the supreme law of fraternal love.'

We should often reflect on the parable of the Good Samaritan. Where are we in the story. We could be any or all of the characters that are depicted there. Are we like the priest and the Levite who passed by on the other side of the road when they saw the victim lying there? It is sometimes easy to find convenient and even religious excuses for not doing what is really required of us. Are we among those who feel that we are left helpless on the roadside by an indifferent and meaningless world? Can we picture ourselves as being like the despised Samaritan who offered the stranger a service of compassion.

No one should feel excluded from our church for no one is excluded from Christ's love and care. This means making ourselves vulnerable to others but it is the way to be faithful to what Christ expects of us.
