**FATHER LIAM SAYS:** In one of our most familiar and favourite hymns we express our need for God's presence in our lives, in these words: Change and decay in all around I see. O Thou who changeth not, abide with me.' We really know that God always abides with us. The problem lies in our difficulty to really abide in him. There is certainly much change and decay around us – and within us too. But there is always new growth and new life.

One of the notable changes in our world is the growth of Artificial Intelligence (AI). Even those who have created it do not understand how it works but it is certainly a dramatic innovation. I believe that it can even translate books! Al companies are hugely increasing their investment in this technology. More and more people are becoming aware of the dangers that it can be misused and get out of control.

Change is certainly happening at an ever-increasing rate and so is the danger of decay, especially when it comes to climate change and the loss of biodiversity and the fragility of governance in our world. There has always been decay in the Church because it is composed of human beings. So from the beginning there have always been attempts at reform. The Synod of the Church is now at a significant stage. The global Synod began in October 2021 and will reach its conclusion in October 2024. Pope Francis has been trying to energise the world-wide Church to see the need for change and to seek guidance from God and from one another how that change should take place.

Synods have been taking place every three years or so for the past fifty years. But the current Synod is certainly the most significant of them. A Synod literally means a journey and, on a journey, means that we learn from one another as we go along. A Synod of the Church above all means learning from Christ as we seek to walk with him.

About 300 bishops representing the different parts of the world together with many lay men and women are meeting in Rome. More than 70 of the non-ordained are voting members. Because of the numbers and the format of the Synod it is taking place in a larger hall than previous Synods. There will be less lectures than usual and much face-to-face interaction in smaller groups, followed by plenary sessions. The Church is now much humbler than it was in the immediate aftermath of the Council. Pope Francis likes to use the image of a 'field hospital'. His vision is of a 'poor Church for the poor' at the service of our wounded world. We are called to be outwardly looking, but we must be transformed internally. We must be more penitent in face of the scandals in the Church and be more welcoming to disaffected groups within the Church and the wider world. The Church is trying to come to terms with the idea of a more visible role for women in decision making and ministry and the possible inclusion in the Diaconate for women. The Synod will consider how to be more inclusive of those who have been divorced and remarried.

Many of these questions will be referred by the Synod for further study and reflection. A more conclusive discernment will not take place until the final session of the Synod in October 2024.

Pope Francis was elected more than 10 years ago and most Catholics are delighted to have him as their Pope. But from the beginning there have been quite a few – including some Cardinals – who have made no secret of their opposition to his way of doing things. In particular there is much dissatisfaction about the whole idea of the Synod. Pope Francis is very tolerant of those who publicly seek to contradict him. But he has the courage to do and say what he believes he should in his service of God and the Church and of the world. We pray for him and for the success of the Synod. Much depends on it.
