FATHER LIAM SAYS: The Synod of the Church, taking place in Rome, is the 16th Synod that has taken place in the sixty years since the Second Vatican Council. Much more work has gone into preparing for it than for any previous Synods and it will not be concluded until after the 2024 assembly next October. That assembly will be attended by the same participants, when the final Synod documents will be produced. Pope Francis is expected to respond to that document in the months afterwards.

The Synod process is taking place against the backdrop of the catastrophic scandal of clerical sexual abuse and other stresses that have been calling out for attention. Pope Francis is seeking to bring a revived sense of mission to the Church and the hope is that new life will emerge as a result. Inside the Synod Hall, participants are divided into 35 working groups, each consisting of 10 or 12 members. Each group have a facilitator to help discernment. Fourteen groups are English speaking, eight are Italian, seven are Spanish, five French and one Portuguese. Each group holds 'conversations' starting with each person talking for no longer than four minutes, before the participants respond top what they have heard. There are also sessions bringing the entire assembly together at which small groups report back on their discussions. Each small group will also formulate a report of their own reflections, recording where there is agreement and where disagreement and tension remain. They won't be asked to agree on each point but whether their report adequately reflects the work they have carried out.

The working document which emerged from all the discussions that took place in parishes and dioceses throughout the world over the last three years or so forms the basis of the discussions. It is not a series of propositions but of questions covering the renewal of governance and decision making. It seeks to ensure greater transparency and accountability and how to involve lay people more meaningfully in the life of the Church. The role of women in the Church was consistently highlighted in the local worldwide discussions as needing urgent attention and so will be a significant topic of the Synod. The question of female deacons has already been the subject of two recent Vatican Commissions and so is on the agenda, as will whether new ministries need to be established.

Obviously, these and other issues will not be resolved in three weeks of Vatican discussions but this stage of the Synod will show where there is substantial agreement and reveal where much work remains to be done. It is thought that local churches will be asked to review, in due course, what the Synod has agreed at this stage and will be asked to provide their reflections ahead of the 2024 summit.

Pope Francis has recently created 21 new Cardinals, 18 of them eligible to vote for his successor when the time comes. Cardinals over 80 have no such vote. Those Cardinals in high profile positions in the Synod will be watched closely by their colleagues to assess their leadership qualities.

Participants have been asked to refrain from giving interviews to the media during the Assembly. The Synod was preceded by a couple of days of prayer and reflection. Representatives of other Christian churches are also present at the Synod, including the Anglican Bishop of Chichester and the Chair of the Baptist World Alliance Commission on Christian Unity. The three-day retreat for all 500 Synod participants took place just before the Assembly got under way. It was held a few miles north of Rome and was led by Father Timothy Radcliffe, the English former Master of the Dominicans, and a Benedictine abbess from Northern Italy, Maria Angelina. The participants also greatly treasure and require our prayers for a successful assembly now and over the coming year.
