FATHER LIAM SAYS: The escalation of violence in Palestine since 7th October has been unparalleled. On that day Hamas terrorists murdered some 1,400 Jews of all ages and took about 200 hostages. In retaliation, several thousands of Palestinians in Gaza have been killed and hundreds of thousands have been forced to flee from their homes. Countless homes have been destroyed and the supply of food, water, medication and fuel has been reduced to a trickle. The pounding of Gaza by the Israeli forces goes on relentlessly as they seek to put an end to Hamas.

When Pope Francis made Mgr Pizzaballa, the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem, a Cardinal on 30th September no one could see how soon and how drastically the whole region would change. The newly created Cardinal offered himself in exchange for children taken hostage by Hamas in an effort to extend diplomatic leverage in the cause of reconciliation. It takes courage to be a Christian in the Holy land, especially when the numbers are so low. Christians in Israel and the Palestinian Territories number about 217,000 or 1.5 per cent of the population. They have been increasingly marginalised by Jews and Muslims over the years of tension and violence and many have left in search of a more peaceful life. In the aftermath of October 7th, the fear of Christians in the region spread far beyond Gaza and Southern Israel. Christians in the West Bank, who number about 37,000 are in a state of total shock and over 90% of pilgrims and visitors have left the country. Pilgrimages have been cancelled well into next year. This is a terrible crisis for many Christian families as 70% work in tourism. Many work as bus drivers, hoteliers and makers of religious objects. Many craft olive wood into rosaries, crosses and cribs. Many of you have bought some of the goods they have brought to our church. Many were already poor. Now they fear abject poverty. Fear of loss of business is compounded by the terror as the escalation of the conflict continues.

The situation is little better in East Jerusalem, home to 10,000 Christians. Hotels are now used as barracks for the Reserve Army, as the tourists have left. Jerusalem is the holy city for Jews, Muslims and Christians. It should be a sign of peace and harmony for everybody.

For Pope Francis, the dangers ahead could not be clearer. Pleading that everything be done to avoid the humanitarian catastrophe getting even greater he declared: 'War solves no problems. It only sows' death and destruction, increased hatred, multiplies revenge. War erases the future.' Gaza's only Catholic Parish is dedicated to the Holy Family. There are about 150 Catholics taking shelter in their church and many more besides. Nearby is the Greek Orthodox church, which has 300 members being looked after. There are two priests caring for the Roman Catholics in Gaza. The Missionaries of Charity are working among them. These are the sisters founded by the now canonised Mother Theresa. Also there are Sisters of the Rosary looking after the disabled elderly. The Catholic charity for persecuted and other suffering Christians, Aid to the Church in Need (ACN) is also trying to alleviate the distress all around. A further fear is that neighbouring countries could get drawn into the conflict.

The Holy Family church in Gaza recently held a candlelight vigil to celebrate the baptism of a little child Daniel. Whatever lies ahead for Daniel and the other Christians and all those in the Holy Land, their very future depends on all sides working together to ensure that the region will enjoy a growth in peace and reconciliation. Anglicans in the occupied West Bank recently wrote to the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, saying that for the first time in its 2,000-year history there was 'a serious threat to extinguish the Christian presence from Gaza.'

If only the United Nations could show – even now – a strong commitment to address the root causes of the violence that has gone on for decades.
