**FATHER LIAM SAYS: Julian of Norwich's 'Revelations of Divine Love'** is the first book by a woman known to be written in English. She wrote two versions of her book. The 'Short' and the 'Long' text. The 'Long' text was the culmination of twenty years of thought and meditation on the visions she received in 1373. She was born in 1342 and died in 1416. Little is known of Julian's personal life, except that she became an anchoress, dedicating her life to prayer and contemplation. She lived permanently alone in a cell attached to St Julian's Church in Norwich. Almost certainly she took her name from that church. In the book she describes herself as a 'symple creature, unlettyred'. By unlettered she meant she had little knowledge of Latin. The visions or 'shewings' were experienced by her during a serous illness. In the book she presents a view of the incarnation and crucifixion of Christ in a profoundly intimate and personal way, emphasising his humanity. She is regarded as one of the greatest English theologians.

The most acute problem with which Christians have constantly wrestled is that of suffering and evil. If God is all powerful and all loving, how is it possible for him to permit so much evil in the world? This was an issue that greatly exercised the mind of Julian – especially in view of the world in which she lived. Norwich fell victim to the Black Death three times during Julian's lifetime – in 1349, 1362 and most virulently in 1369, so she had severe experience of pain and loss. She struggled to fathom out how the immense suffering she witnessed could be squared with God's mercy and the mystery of Redemption.

Her revelations made it clear that divine love is the 'ground of all being'. 'And in this (vision), he showed me a little thing, the size of a hazelnut, lying in the palm of my hand, it seemed, and it was as round as any ball. I looked thereupon with the eye of my understanding, and I thought, 'What may this be?' And the answer came to me, 'It is all that is made.' I wondered how it could last, for it was so small I thought it might suddenly disappear. And I was answered in my understanding, 'It lasts and ever shall, for God loves it, and so everything has its beginning by the love of God.

In this little thing I saw three properties: the first is that God made it, the second is that God loves it, the third is that God cares for it.'

Near the conclusion of her book she articulates this point well. 'From the time it was revealed, I desired many times to know in what was Our Lord's meaning. And fifteen years after and more, I was answered in spiritual understanding and it was said: What, do you wish to know your Lord's meaning in this thing? Know it well, love was his meaning. Who reveals it to you? Love. What did he reveal to you? Love. Why does he reveal it to you? For love. Why does he reveal it to you? For love. Remain in this and you will know more of the same. But you will never know different, without end.' It is this emphasis on the love of God for all creation and for all humanity in particular, that shines through Julian's whole text. Her implacable faith and optimism was grounded on the comforting words she received from Jesus: 'I shall make all things well.' For Julian, this divine love is revealed in many ways. The compassion, loving condescension and kindness of God empties himself in order to enter fully into the pain of his creation. It is God's love, she stresses, which holds us in being. 'He is our clothing, who wraps and enfolds us for love, embraces us and shelters us, surrounds us for his love, which is so tender that he may never desert us'. She draws parallels between Jesus and earthly mothers. 'The mothers service is nearest, readiest and surest. No one might ever or could perform this office fully, except only him. We know that all our mothers bear us for pain and for death... But our true Mother Jesus, he alone bears us for joy and for endless life, blessed may he be. The mother can give her child to suck of her milk, but our precious Mother Jesus can feed us with himself and does most courteously and most tenderly, with the blessed Sacrament, which is the precious food of true life. The mother can lay her child tenderly to her breast but our tender Mother Jesus leads us easily through his sweet open side and shows us there a part of the godhead and of the joys of heaven with inner certainty of endless bliss.

Noting how Julian of Norwich's life and writings are "increasingly being acknowledged and celebrated," Pope Francis said that "her maternal influence, humble anonymity and profound theological insights stand as timely reminders" of the importance of faith in God and assisting one another.
