Please see our new Safeguarding Training Poster (in the Front Porch). The CSSA Level 3 course is now the only training we are offering. The training has been piloted and has received positive feedback including: 'It is Church related training. It is just one course with both Child Protection and Vulnerable Adults included. We no longer need consent from volunteers as they will enrol themselves for the training.

A MESSAGE FROM CO-CHAIRMAN OF ENGLISH MARTYRS SCHOOL: Some of our children from English Martyrs Primary School will be making their First Holy Communion on next Sunday at English Martyrs Church. This will be a joyous occasion for the children and one that we know they are looking forward to celebrating. Since September 2023, a new Religious Education Directory (RED) of teaching was introduced to all Catholic schools. This involved our school having to purchase new RE materials and resources at considerable cost to the school. Current spending is over £1,000. We are appealing to your generosity for financial support to buy new resources which the school will need to purchase for the start of the new academic year 2025/26. You might also like to know that English Martyrs School had their new Catholic Schools Inspection (CSI) in February and received a 'Good' rating overall with one of the three categories as 'Outstanding'. This was for 'Collective Worship'. This highlights the excellent RE teaching by the Head Teacher, all the staff and the children. FATHER LIAM SAYS: One of the most exciting objects to be discovered in Ireland in recent years was a book of Psalms dating back 1.200 years. It is now known as the Fadden More Psalter because it was found in a bog in Fadden More in County Tipperary. The operator of a mechanical digger spotted the book in the bucket of the machine – though it certainly did not look like a book. He contacted the owners of the bog and they gathered together the fragments and covered them with wet peat. Then they notified the staff of the National Museum of Ireland. This discovery was made in July 2006 in a vast area of peatland. It was quite astonishing that an object so small and brown – the same colour as the bog – should come to light.

The A4-sized manuscript originally contained sixty pages of vellum – a parchment made from animal skins. It would originally have contained the complete text in Latin of all one hundred and fifty of the Psalms of the Bible. About 15% had survived. The pages were contained in a tanned leather cover which also survived. This cover would have been the early medieval equivalent of a folder. The vellum pages alone would have required the skins of thirty calves. The senior conservationist working on the restoration of the Psalter describes its survival as miraculous as normally vellum 'shouldn't survive – it should gelatinise away'.

What was this Book of Psalms doing in the bog? The work that had gone into its production was enormous. The making of the vellum and the painstaking work of writing out all those psalms so beautifully was a tremendous labour of love. So why was it abandoned? It is thought that it came from a monastery that existed not far away in Birr. Like many monasteries of the time it may have been attacked in one of the many Viking raids. Perhaps a monk had hidden it and didn't live to tell the tale! We will never know.

All large monasteries would have had a scriptorium where precious manuscripts – especially books of the Bible – would have been laboriously copied. The most widely used book of the Bible would have been the Book of Psalms. The singing of the Psalms at various hours of the day and night was a very important part of the life of the monks. The Book of Psalms was the great prayer book of the Jewish people. It was the prayer book of Jesus himself. The fact that this 8th Century manuscript survived in such inauspicious circumstances testifies to the care and devotion of those who fashioned it. Could you imagine a book of today surviving – in the ground – for over a thousand years into the future! This is 'the first early medieval manuscript to come to light in two hundred years anywhere in Europe' according to Mr Gillis, the chief conservator working on the Psalter.

The whole Christian landscape in Ireland was studded with monasteries for hundreds of years. They provided much employment for the people living nearby as well as being major centres of learning and health and social provision. They had a huge influence on the spiritual life of the people. Many could not join the monks in the singing in Latin of the Psalms. Psalters were few and expensive and many could not read. But the praying of the Rosary was an adaptation of praying the Psalms. Until twenty years ago there were fifteen mysteries of the rosary made up of the Joyful, Sorrowful and Glorious Mysteries. (Pope John Paul II added the Mysteries of Light) People meditated on these events of the Life of Christ while reciting ten Hail Mary's – or a decade – at each Mystery. The full Rosary of fifteen Mysteries would involve reciting one hundred and fifty Hail Mary's – the same number of Psalms as there are in the Psalter.
