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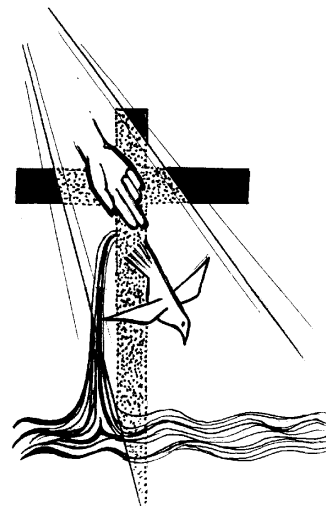

FATHER LIAM SAYS FATHER LIAM SAYS: One of the ways in which the Vatican tries to raise money is through issuing postage stamps at every opportunity. The Vatican Post Office issued a series of stamps to mark the year 2000 which, of course, was a Holy Year. So stamps appeared commemorating all the Popes who had welcomed pilgrims to Rome for all the Holy Years, the first one was in 1300 and the next will be 2025.

It is over nineteen and a half years since the death of Pope St John Paul and forty-six years since he was elected – the first non-Italian Pope in four hundred and fifty years. In 1981 a serious attempt was made on his life in St. Peter's Square. The Sunday following he insisted on broadcasting a message from his hospital bed when it was still not clear if he would survive in which he prayed for the two people who were wounded with him and 'for the brother who struck me down and I forgive him sincerely.' He spoke slowly and somewhat breathlessly and was obviously in pain.

In his long pontificate he canonised four hundred and eighty two men and women and beatified one thousand, three hundred and thirty eight. Since the Congregation for the Causes of Saints – The Vatican office that deals with canonisations and beatifications was set up in 1588 – he had made far more saints than all of the Popes of the last four centuries put together.

He visited the United Kingdom in May 1982 – a visit that was in doubt owing to the outbreak of hostilities between Argentina and the United Kingdom. Among his many initiatives was the World Day of Peace at Assisi in which he joined with representatives of other Christian Churches as well as Jewish, Muslim and other world religions in praying for our tortured world. The World Youth Day (lasting nearly a week) held every three years or so is testament to his ministry to young people.

He left a lasting mark on Europe and played a major role in the largely non-violent downfall of Communism. The end of the Communist regime in Poland helped to trigger the collapse of Communism elsewhere in Eastern Europe. But Europe has experienced a steady erosion of religious practice and beliefs. He encouraged better relationships with other Christians. In January 2000 as part of the services for the start of the Jubilee Year, the Holy Door in the Basilica of St Paul's Outside the Walls was opened. The Pope was flanked by Metropolitan Athanasios (representing the Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew) and by Archbishop George Carey of Canterbury who together pushed open the Holy Door. In April 1994 he hosted a Holocaust memorial concert in the Paul VI Audience Hall of the Vatican featuring the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. John Paul sat with the Chief Rabbi of Rome and his congregation. He was the first Pope to pray in a Mosque which he did in Damascus in 2001. Years earlier in 1985 he spoke to a crowd of over a hundred thousand young Muslims in Morocco at the invitation of King Hassan II. No Pope in more than thirteen hundred years of Islam had ever been invited by a Muslim leader to do anything like that.

In November 2002 he was invited to address the Italian Parliament – another first for any Pope. He made over one hundred journeys outside Italy and visited at least one hundred and thirty countries but was denied the chance of visiting China and Russia. He also tried to visit the parishes of his Diocese of Rome. When not away on overseas visits he tried to visit a parish every weekend and sometimes on the Patronal Feast that fell during the week. There are three hundred and thirty three parishes in the Diocese of Rome and he had visited three hundred and seventeen of them before he fell seriously ill. Before his death hundreds and thousands of young people converged on Rome. They wanted to pay their last respects. Reportedly his last whispered message before he fell unconscious was for the young: 'I went looking for you. You came to me, for that I thank you.'
