Father Liam says: A very ancient practice of Catholic life was the custom of dressing the wells at certain times of the year. Wells were essential features of every town and village from time immemorial. It is only in comparatively modern times that water is literally on tap in our houses. The well was where people gathered to collect water for their daily needs. The ceremony of blessing the wells was an acknowledgement of the importance of a plentiful supply of clean water.

The blessing took place on Rogation Days, days of special prayer. The Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday before Ascension Thursday were observed as days of solemn supplication, when the Litany of the Saints was sung as people walked in procession. The Latin word 'Rogatio' means 'litany'. In England the Synod of Cloveshore in 747 prescribes processions and fasting on the three days before the Ascension 'according to the ways of our fathers'.

The lovely custom of dressing the Wells at Rogation-time never ceased entirely. It is still carried out today but it is mainly a Derbyshire custom now. The making of the flower and leaf panels with which the wells are decked has become a hereditary craft of a very high order. Several years ago I spent a few days in Derbyshire and was thrilled to discover those works of art in so many towns and villages, such as Tissington, Buxton and Winksworth. I am sure each location was trying to outdo their neighbours and impress the visitors who came principally to see. But for the makers and local people the decorations are a preparation for the parish ceremonies during which the wells are blessed and thanksgiving is given to God for the gift of pure water. This is one of our most ancient customs, which sprang originally from pre-Christian times and lived on throughout the Middle Ages and survived the Reformation. The more extreme reformers disliked it but it was part of the annual cycle of events when the bounds of the parish were beaten and a blessing asked for their fields and wells and homes.

Pilgrimages were once seen as a very Catholic thing. One of the greatest places of pilgrimage in England was Walsingham. So many of the shrines were broken in the sixteenth century that it seemed that the last pilgrimage had been made and that never again would the roads of England be trodden by the feet of the devout on their way to some holy place. That was what the Reformers believed and hoped. But there has been a revival of pilgrimages by people of other faiths to several ancient shrines and holy wells. At Walsingham every year pilgrimages are made by Roman Catholics to the Slipper Chapel, where a reproduction of the famous shrine of Our Lady stands and the other to the Anglican chapel in the town itself. This chapel was built in 1931 to house another modern copy of the original image. Anglican pilgrims go to St. Albans every year and to Lindisfarne, Glastonbury and Canterbury and to holy wells, such as Bawburgh and Binsey.

2025 will be a Jubilee Year. The beginning of the Holy Year will be marked by the celebration of Mass in every Cathedral church in the world on 29th December and the theme of the Holy Year is 'Pilgrims of Hope'. It is not intended that there will be a Diocesan Pilgrimage to Rome during the Jubilee year but a pilgrimage to Walsingham is being arranged to take place from Friday 6th to Sunday 8th June.

Walsingham has indeed risen from the ashes. The scene today is transformed from what the beleaguered Catholics experienced under Elizabeth I as expressed by an anonymous poet in her reign:

'Bitter, bitter oh to behold the grass to grow
Where the walls of Walsingham so stately did show.
Such were the works of Walsingham while she did stand,
Such are the wrecks as now do show of that holy land.
Level, level with the ground the towers do lie,
Which with their golden, glittering top pierced once to the sky'.
