Father Liam says: just over five years ago Cardinal John Henry Newman was canonized in Rome. He is regarded by many as the greatest of all English theologians. We may not be familiar with much of his writings but we often sing his hymn, 'Praise to the Holiest in the Height'. They refer to the coming of the Saviour:

'O loving wisdom of our God, When all was sin and shame. A second Adam to the fight And to the rescue came'.

Into a world scarred by sin and shame, wars and violence, hunger and injustice, a second Adam had to come to rescue and restore us. In the first Adam flesh and blood had failed and led us astray. The Second Adam came 'to strive afresh against the foe, should strive and should prevail.'

At Christmas we celebrate the birth of this second Adam. 'To you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour who is the messiah, the Lord'. (Luke 2:11) We believe that the person whose birth we commemorate at Christmas is truly and fully human and truly and fully divine. He is true God and true man. In the coming of Christ to us we are given:

'God's presence and His very self

And Essence all-divine'.

Before any of the gospels were written the early followers of Christ were emphasizing in their teaching and preaching that Jesus was the unique Son of God, who had become one of us and by his death and resurrection he had won salvation for us.

In the early centuries of the Church there were many controversies about who exactly Jesus was. Jesus could not be our Saviour if he was not the Son of God. But the central truth of the Christian faith was strongly challenged by the followers of Arius. What became known as the Arian heresy was strongly contested and condemned at the First Council of the Church which was held at a place called Nicaea in 325. Next year marks 1,700 years since that historic event. Nicaea is in northwest Turkey and is known as Izhik today. Pope Francis intends to be at the special celebrations. All the General Councils of the Church in the early centuries took place in Eastern Europe and are recognized by the Orthodox Churches, which did not break from Rome until the 11th century.

The deliberations of the Council of Nicaea led to the promulgation of the Nicene Creed. Back then there was a debate about the possibility of a joint date for all churches to celebrate Easter. The Nicaea Council celebrations next year, the Pope says, 'would strengthen existing bonds and encourage all Christians to offer renewed testimony in today's world'.

As it happens both the Eastern and the Roman calendar mark Easter on the same day -20^{th} April - in 2025. The coming celebrations will surely encourage new efforts to be made to agree on a common date for Easter every year! Patriarch Bartholomew of Constantinople said last May: 'It is a scandal to celebrate separately the unique event of the one Resurrection of the One Lord'. This visit would be the second visit of Pope Francis to Turkey.

A considerable portion of all four gospels are devoted to the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus. In fact, scholars nowadays would say that the earliest continuous section of the gospels to be written were the accounts of the Lord's passion and Resurrection. Surprisingly in the whole New Testament only two authors pay attention to the birth and childhood of Jesus – only Matthew and Luke give us 'Infancy Narratives'. Neither of these was composing simply a life of Jesus. In order that what they wrote to be part of the Good News, it had to have religious value. This is the key to understanding the infancy accounts. Despite the fact that Luke and Matthew fashioned very different birth stories they agreed remarkably in a common religious message about the conception of Jesus and his significance for the world.
