8. A MESSAGE FROM KALINGALINGA: Thank you very much for the cheque for Our Lady's Hospice, Kalingalinga for £3337.55. I met some of the patients that you support. One was a lady with no legs. She was run over by her husband, who has not since been seen – they have not been able to trace any of her family. She was taken to the Hospice by a White Father. The lady is now in a wheelchair but cannot talk. A man was digging a ditch when the rope broke. He has a broken back and is paralysed. Over a long period of time the Hospice has helped him to be able to sit up. He was orphaned as a child. Often these people are taken to the Hospice by a kind person who thinks that are going to die, but because of the medical care and support that they receive they are alive, and making progress, even if it is very slow. The Hospice is doing a lot of preventive work. Last year there were over 600 outpatients who were treated. By doing this very few become terminal. The local people say they receive better treatment than Government Hospitals. Wishing you and your Parishioners many blessings in 2025, Sr Margaret

Father Liam says: About 30 million tourists – and pilgrims – visit Rome every year. More than twice that number are expected to make the journey this year because 2025 is a Holy Year. The Jubilee started on Christmas Eve. Because of this

the city of Rome has been in chaos with closed roads and museums and churches being prepared for the influx. You can be sure that the Sistine Chapel will be among the most thronged places. Maybe, people realizing what Rome will be like might be tempted to visit Goring instead in even greater numbers to view our Sistine ceiling Reproduction.

The Sistine Chapel was built in 1475 and was a combination of a papal chapel and a fortification as the exterior suggests. It is called 'Sistine' after Pope Sixtus IV, a Franciscan who was Bishop of Rome from 1471 to 1484. Pope Sixtus had the ceiling painted as a blue sky with golden stars. The ceiling was so high that Sixtus thought it too great a challenge for elaborate painting. He concentrated on the walls and he commissioned splendid paintings by some of the great Renaissance masters – the life of Moses on the south wall and the life of Christ on the north wall. He wanted to show the close connection between God's revelations of himself to the people of Israel and God's self- revelation in Christ to the whole world.

In 1503 – 19 years after the death of Pope Sixtus, the Cardinals chose a nephew of Sixtus – who took the name Julius – as Pope. Shortly afterwards cracks in the vault began to appear and the soil beneath the chapel began to shift. Iron bars were installed in the ceiling and in the floor to hold the vault together and to steady the foundations. The chapel was stabilized but the ceiling was a mess. Pope Julius wanted to commission the brilliant artist from Florence, Michelangelo, to replace the starry sky motif. He had already hired Michelangelo to sculpt him a colossal tomb – but Michelangelo did not want to paint the ceiling and refused. He was a sculptor rather than a painter. But Pope Julius insisted and ordered Michelangelo to return to Rome and get on with it. Julius came up with a design but Michelangelo didn't like it and so came up with his own plan – the wonderful copy of which Gary has provided us with.

Gary's task was monumental but Michelangelo's was greater. How was he to cover 12,000 square feet of vaulted space with fresco on a surface with flat and curved spaces and make the entire design hang together. He decided to create a visual epic – the creation of the world and the early history of the human race. It stretched across the vault from West to East in nine great paintings – three on the creation of nature, three on the creation of humankind and three on the story of Noah. Filling the peripheries there were ancient prophets and sibyls, heralds of the world's redemption and crucial moments in the history of Israel. It took four years for him to execute the plan. When the people of Rome saw it on All Saint's Day 1512, everyone, including Pope Julius, was stunned. Nothing this magnificent had ever been done before. When Julius had finally stopped asking 'when will it be done?' Michelangelo must surely have thought that he was finished with the Sistine Chapel.

Perhaps the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel should be called the Julian ceiling, after Pope Julius. But over twenty years after completing it another Pope – the fourth successor of Julius – Paul III asked Michelangelo to execute a vast fresco of the Risen Christ on the chapel's altar wall, replacing a number of other frescoes. This time Michelangelo didn't resist. This painting is usually called 'The Last Judgement' and when it was completed in 1541 all Rome was once again awestruck.

In 1987 when on a pilgrimage to Rome, Gary was inspired to reproduce the Sistine Ceiling in our church. At that time the church ceiling was covered in fibreboard. He recovered the ceiling using marine plywood sheets. Shortly after starting this massive project the ceiling in Rome began to be restored. After 475 years the brilliant paintwork of Michelangelo was decidedly faded. Very nobly Gary was given pictures of what the renewed ceiling looked like, so it was extremely lucky that Gary did not embark on the project earlier. We now have the joy of seeing it in the very vivid colours that Michelangelo used. The acrylic paints that had just then become available for Gary to use gave a fresco like effect that after 35 years still sparkles.

On 8th April 1994 – Easter Friday – Pope John Paul II celebrated Mass in the Sistine Chapel to mark the completion of the restoration of the Michelangelo frescos. By that time Gary had completed his reproduction of one of the greatest artistic masterpieces of all time. Many people visit our church to admire it.
