Father Liam says: Christian pilgrims have visited the Holy Land from the time of Emperor Constantine who gave Christians freedom to worship in 325 AD. A pilgrim whose account of her pilgrimage has come down to us was a woman named Egeria, who made her visit between the years 381 and 384. The text of her travels was lost for 700 years. Late in the 19th century, when the manuscript was found in Italy, the only part left was the middle of the book. No doubt the name of the pilgrim would have appeared at the beginning or end of the text but it was lost. Scholars now say that there is solid evidence for the name Egeria. She wrote her account in a number of letters to her 'sisters'. This might be her Christian friends or a title for fellow members of a Religious Society. We know very little about her but she seems to have come from Galicia in Spain.

She is an eager traveler who has plenty of time and, as she confesses, is of boundless curiosity. The things which most interest her are those which improve her understanding of the Christian faith. She is constantly thankful to her guides and her hosts and to God who has enabled her to make these journeys by which, she says, 'her hopes were fulfilled'. She writes in unusual Latin but she is familiar with the bible and the worship and prayers of the Church. She describes how Holy Week was celebrated in Jerusalem over 1600 years ago.

'The next day, Sunday, is the beginning of the Easter week or, as they call it here 'The Great Week'. On this Sunday the bishop reads the Gospel of the Lord's Resurrection at first cockcrow, as he does every Sunday through the year. Then till daybreak they do everything as they would do on an ordinary Sunday. They assemble as they do every Sunday in the Great Church at the Anastasis (the church of the Resurrection) and the Cross. When the service in the Great Church (known as the Martyrium because it is on Golgotha) has taken place in the usual way before the dismissal, the archdeacon makes his announcement: 'During this week let us meet at three in the afternoon at the Martyrium. At one o'clock today let us be ready on the Eleona.' At one o'clock all the people go up to the Eleona Church on the Mount of Olives and they have hymns and antiphons suitable to the place and the day. When three o'clock comes, they go up with hymns and sit down at the Imbomon, the place from which the Lord ascended into heaven, and there too they have hymns suitable to the place and the day, with readings and prayers between them. At five o'clock the passage is read from the Gospel about the people 'who met the Lord with palm branches, saying, 'Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord.''

At this the bishop and all the people rise from their places and start off on foot down from the summit of the Mount of Olives. Everyone is carrying branches, either palm or olive, and they accompany the bishop in the very way the people did when once they went down the hill with the Lord. They go on foot all the way down the Mount to the city, and all through the city to the Anastasis, (The church of the Resurrection) but they have to go very gently on account of the older women and men among them who might get tired. So it is already late when they reach the Anastasis; but even though it is late they hold Lucernare (a service of light) when they get there, then have a prayer at the Cross, and the people are dismissed.

On Monday, the next day, they do the same as in the rest of Lent from cockcrow till morning, at nine o'clock and at Midday. But at three o'clock everyone meets in the Great church, the Martyrium and there they spend some time singing with readings and prayers. This goes on until seven in the evening and at seven Lucernare (light service) is held there. The dismissal takes place in the night and then they go to the Anastasis. They have one hymn and a prayer and then the Catechumens are blessed and the faithful followed by the dismissal. Tuesday and Wednesday are the same as Monday and they go home very late indeed.
