Father Liam says: The words used when we are anointed with the oil of Chrism at our Confirmation are: 'Be sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit'. A seal signifies authenticity. We celebrate in Confirmation that we are truly temples of the Holy Spirit. We are given the seal of God's approval. Our ancestors used wax seals to prove their identity and to authenticate official documents. We still speak of sealing the deal and we seal things with a kiss. Much like the Pin Numbers and Signatures we use now, our medieval forebears used seals. Many people used signet rings for this purpose. 'Signet' is from the old French, meaning 'small seal'. But such rings were also worn as personal jewelry.

Seals are still used today. The Great Seal of the Realm, King Charles' seal, is put on official documents and is considered to be more official than his personal signature.

Seals came into common use in Britain under the Normans in the early 1100's. A blob of beeswax would be melted and a personal identifying imprint would be made into it. The seal would then be fixed to the document to prove it was not a forgery. The item used to make the imprint in the wax is known as a 'seal matrix'. Wealthy families and institutions would commission unique engraver seal matrices which they would protect carefully. Just like now, identity theft was a worry and if you lost your seal, it could be misused by others.

Twelve years or so ago, Tony Burke discovered a large lump of metal in a field in Cobham, when using a metal detector. It weighed 84 grams. He recognized it as a seal matrix of some kind and reported it to the local Finds Liaison Officer. On one side of the copper alloy matrix is an impressively detailed depiction of the Virgin Mary with the child Jesus on her knee. The child holds a book in his left hand and points upwards with his other hand. Mary is holding a flower in her hand. Around the image is an inscription in Latin. In English it reads 'The Seal of the Church of St Mary and Saint Wulfad the Martyr of Stone'. At first it was thought that the Seal might have been something to do with Staines – a place name meaning 'Stone' that was relatively close by. But St Wulfad was not a local saint so a connection to an Augustinian Priory in Stone, Staffordshire, was established.



The Priory was founded in the mid-twelfth century but in the 1530's it was one of the first victims of Henry VIII's Dissolution of the Monasteries. Henry wanted to acquire the lands and properties of the religious houses in his realm of England and Ireland. He ordered that monasteries, priories and abbeys be disbanded, their property to be reallocated and all the proceeds to be paid to the Crown.

The King's agents first targeted small religious houses with an income less than £200 per year, so it is thought that it was at this point in 1536 that the Stone Matrix was moved. It is possible that a monk from Stone moved to the Newark Augustine Priory in Surrey, which survived until 1540. He would have taken with him the most portable and important possessions he could. At this point the Seal Matrix would already have been more than 200 years old. As an emblem of the doomed priory of Stone, it would have been an important item to try and save.

The Stone priory buildings were quickly dismantled and destroyed, but the main church building was saved by local parishioners. They continued to use it as the Anglican Parish Church until 1758 when it was eventually demolished and replaced by the current church of St Michael and St Wulfad.

A legend of Stone and St Wulfad tells that when the Anglo-Saxon King of Mercia, Wulfhere, heard that his sons Wulfad and Rufin had converted to Christianity he had them put to death. Their mother ordered that her murdered sons be buried and the grave marked by a stone cairn and so the town that grew up around the

spot took on the name Stone. When King Wulfhere eventually converted to Christianity around 670 AD, he had a church built on the site of the martyred sons' graves in their honour and in penitence for his crime. Certainly there was a pagan King Wulfhere who became a Christian and founded a number of religious sites in Mercia. But there is no further evidence of his sons Wulfad and Rufin, despite their being local churches dedicated to both names. The Seal Matrix is now on display at Stone Parish Church.
