Father Liam says: When we met here on Sunday – or Saturday evening – a lot of what we do is centered on a book or on a table. Sunday is not just another day – it is the Lord's Day. The book is also very special. It is the Word of the Lord and the table is the Table of the Lord. And we come together to celebrate the Supper of the Lord. The Lord is central to our lives and he is the reason we gather. The Lord is our Risen Saviour and we gather around him at his invitation. We are his people and the sheep of his flock.

Because he is our Shepherd, we assemble at his bidding to do the task he asks of us. There is a special name for this task. It is called the Liturgy. This is a Greek term meaning 'The Work of the People'. The liturgy is done by an assembly – by the people gathered together to do this special task together. We do not come to be an audience or to be spectators. We come because of who we are – brothers and sisters of Christ – and because of who he is – our Risen Saviour, our Lord and God and our great High Priest. We are called to join with him in offering honour and glory to the Father. It is the great action of Christ but it is our action too – our Liturgy – because through our baptism we share in the priesthood of our one High Priest and we gather together and support and encourage one another. We are family.

We are all privileged to come here on Sunday, not to 'go to' Mass or 'attend' Mass but together to celebrate the Mass. Each baptized person is needed here because what we do takes all of us to do. During our time together each Sunday the Church – the assembly – is doing in this room what the Church needs to do in order to be the Church. The deeds are done not simply by one individual and another individual but by the Church here assembled. When we come together, we do not come to pray alone for an hour or so. We come to place ourselves beside brothers and sisters and to give of our best to the work the Church has to do here. It is the Church that listens to God's loving word, it is the Church that prays together for the needs of the world. It is the Church that gives God thanks and praise over bread and wine which Jesus, our Great High Priest blesses and transforms into the Bread of Life and the cup of Salvation for us just as he did for his first followers at the Last Supper. None of us does this alone for it is the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist – it is the work of the assembled Christian Community.

We come here as very human, very distracted, very preoccupied with our own worries, our own agendas. So, it is difficult perhaps to believe that you, as an individual person, are God's beloved as is every brother and sister of ours of every race and religion and condition in all the world. But we are here to set all that aloneness aside, because this is the Church, the gathering of God's family. Every Sunday as we come through these doors we take water and sign ourselves with the Cross. In this way we acknowledge that we are conscious of our identity. The blessed water reminds us of our baptism into the Church – into the family of Father, Son and Holy Spirit and into the family of God's children. We are meant to be conscious of one another when we come in. Some people may, of necessity, come much later. There should always be room for latecomers near the door. It is a sign of welcome. A sign that we are conscious of others. It is a gracious thing to do and it is gracious to acknowledge other people as we come in and as they come in. You might consider quietly telling them your name. How many people that you regularly see at church can you put a name on? It would be a shame if someone came and left on Sunday without making others feel welcome and without feeling welcome ourselves. We are after all the family of God and Sunday Mass is our family celebration, if we make it so.
