Father Liam says: What is a Parish? Canon Law – the law of the Catholic Church – says that 'a parish is a certain community of the Christian faithful stably constituted in a particular church whose pastoral care is entrusted to a pastor under the authority of the diocesan bishop (515). Let us look at the first ten words telling us that 'a parish is a certain community of the Christian faithful'. This helps us to understand how we are called to be right now, and how we are going to have to be into the future. We are a community – 'a certain community'. We are the Catholic community in Goring. We are preparing to be part of a wider community – the new parish of Worthing. It tells us that our faith is not a private matter. Even though we are called to have a personal relationship with God, we are also called to have a personal relationship with others – 'with the community of the Christian faithful'.

From the very beginning the followers of Jesus were first known as 'followers of the Way'. We are called to band together with others to follow him. But our sense of community in all kinds of ways has been eroded. People live lives that are more isolated than in the past and as Christians we tend to see our faith as a private matter between God and us. But we are called to help each other to live out our faith. We are called to look out for one another. The word 'church' owes more in its meaning to 'a gathering of people' than it does to 'a building'. The word church means a gathering, a coming together. We come together because Christ calls us to work together, to pray together, to grow together.

Does having three Sunday Masses help us to form a community? In the future we won't have three weekend Masses. Perhaps in time there will be one weekend Mass. There is a sense in which unity is strength. In the first description of how Sunday Mass was celebrated St Justin, writing in the year 155 AD says: 'on the day we call the day of the sun all who dwell in the city or country gather in the same place'. There was no multiplicity of Eucharistic celebrations. Even though people had to walk they all gathered in one place because they saw themselves as a community - the community of Christ, gathered to celebrate his presence with them and their willingness to support and strengthen one another. This they did in spite of fierce persecution. Justin was writing to the emperor to desist from persecuting them because they were no threat to him. But he, like so many others, were martyred for their faithful fidelity to the Eucharist. It is good to look to the past and learn lessons from it. There are many things there that we should learn to treasure and emulate. There are also indications for us to find new ways forward. Someone said that the past is a good place of reference and a terrible place of residence. St Oscar Romero has this to say: 'It is good now and then to stand back from things and to look at them in perspective. Our endeavours will not achieve the Kingdom of God. That is way beyond even the horizon of our sight. In our lifetime we bring to completion only a tiny fraction of the colossal enterprise. That will reveal the fulness of God's creation. No statement expresses all that can be said. No creed exhausts the depths of our faith. No evangelization unites all minds and hearts. No programme completes the Church's mission. No setting of goals includes all and everything. That is our situation, our limitation. We plant the grain of seed that one day will burst open and grow. We water the buds that have already sprouted, knowing much more is promised. It is a liberating experience when we become aware of this. It makes us capable of doing good and doing it very well. It may be imperfect but it is a start, a step on the way. An opening for God's grace to intervene and do the rest. We cannot do everything ourselves. We may never be able to see the final result. But that is the difference between the architect and the labourer. We are labourers, not architects. We are prophets of a future that does not belong to us alone'.
