Father Liam says: Familiarity can make us oblivious to the beauty about us and our church has great beauty. For years many coach loads of visitors have been coming, especially in the summer months, to admire our wonderful ceiling. It is good to be reminded that our church is the only one in the world that has a reproduction of Michelangelo's Sistine Chapel ceiling in Rome. The Sistine Chapel is so named because it was built by Pope Sixtus IV who was Pope from 1471 to 1484. It is the place where the Cardinals meet when deciding who the next Pope will be, and the place from which the white smoke arises when they have made their choice. We hope that no more will arise for many years to come.

Michelangelo did not wish to paint the ceiling. He saw himself as a sculptor, not a painter. When his mother died, he was fostered out to the family of a stonecutter who lived near Florence. There he came into contact with marble – the medium that would bring him early fame. In his life he was called 'il Divino'. He had no wish for riches and paid little attention to food or clothing. Throughout his long life of 89 years, he remained lean and muscular. He often slept in his clothes and seldom washed. He cared only for the perfecting of his art. He was a loner and did not encourage apprentices to attach themselves to him. In his youth he also carved in wood and gave a wooden crucifix to a priest who had allowed him 'a room to work in and bodies to study'. The bodies were entrusted to the Church for burial. Michelangelo was most grateful for the opportunity that the priest gave him to make this secretive study of anatomy. The study certainly paid off. By his early twenties Michelangelo was sculpting some of his most accomplished works, notably a Pieta, depicting Jesus taken down from the cross and placed in the arms of his mother. Another masterpiece in marble was David, the most famous of all depictions of King David, which is placed in Florence's central square in front of the Town Hall.

When Julius II was elected Pope in 1505, he began planning a worthy tomb for his own, eventual internment. He had in mind an enormous monument with 45 life-sized statues and Michelangelo was commissioned for the project. But the Pope had trouble in finding the right place. Michelangelo was now 30, half the age of the Pope. Time went by with no work on the tomb so Julius told Michelangelo to occupy himself by painting the ceiling in the Sistine Chapel. Michelangelo, who did not rate painting very highly, had to learn the elaborate art of frescoing. The result was the most splendid work of this reluctant painter's amazing career. While Michelangelo remained for four years busy working on his elaborate painting, the equally busy warring Pope in silver armour was leading Papal armies through Northern Italy, forming a holy league with Venice and Spain, then with England and Switzerland, driving the French from Italy and adding new territories to the Papal States. When Pope Julius was able to take in what Michelangelo was about he found himself more and more lost in admiration at the artist. But when Julius ordered him to enrich his Old Testament figures in the ceiling by adding gold leaf to the draperies Michelangelo refused outright saying: 'My Lord, they were all poor men'. When Julius died in 1513 his tomb remained unfurnished. Julius had run out of funds and now he had run out of time. Today his much-reduced monument stands in the side aisle of the modest church of St Peter in Chains. Central to the monument is the statue of Moses, which Michelangelo considered his most life-like creation.

Michelangelo much later was commissioned by Pope Clement VII to paint a vast mural on the wall above the main altar in the Sistine Chapel. It was to take seven years and was completed in 1544. Michelangelo titled it The Resurrection but it is known today as The Last Judgement. One of the nudes in Hell – and there were many nudes – resembled a certain Cardinal who brought a complaint to the Pope who explained that Popes have no jurisdiction over Hell. Scripture tells us that 'Naked I came out of my mother's womb and naked I shall return'.
