Father Liam says: Today we celebrate the Feast of St Philip Howard, who is one of the English Martyrs. He, together with Mary the Mother of Jesus, is patron of our diocese. The Forty Martyrs of England and Wales were canonised on 25th October 1970 and our church was completed very shortly afterwards. The first Mass in our church was at Christmas 1970.

Fifty-five years ago Pope Paul VI canonised forty of more than four hundred men and women who gave their lives rather than deny their faith during the turbulent years of the 16th and 17th centuries. Pope Paul himself is now canonised. In his homily he emphasised that the Forty Martyrs had been 'loyal to the Crown' to the end but that 'faced with a choice of remaining faithful to the revealed truths of their faith, or of denying them and saving their lives, they chose martyrdom without hesitation'.

Philip Howard was born in June 1557, the son of Thomas Howard, Duke of Norfolk, who Elizabeth I had executed in 1572 for his alleged involvement in a plot against her. Despite being baptized as a Catholic, Philip was raised as a Protestant. He graduated from St John's College, Cambridge in 1574. As a 14-year-old he married Anne Dacre, Countess of Arundel. In February 1580 Philip became Earl of Arundel but he was not restored to his father's Dukedom. Frequently in the Royal Court, he began to gain favour with Elizabeth.

He was present when Edmund Campion, subsequently canonised, strenuously defended the Catholic faith and Philip was greatly influenced by this. The Howards had many enemies and Philip was rapidly falling from the Queen's favour. His wife Anne became a Catholic and Philip returned to his faith. Many young priests, mainly Jesuits, who had been educated in Europe were gaining many converts to Catholicism. Anne was banished from the Court and placed under arrest in Surrey where she gave birth to their daughter Ellizabeth. The suspicion intensified and Philip was imprisoned in the Tower of London for a short time. Meantime, laws against Catholics became to be stringently enforced so Philip and his wife Anne, with their daughter Elizabeth decided to leave the country.. Before he left, he wrote an eloquent letter to Queen Elizabeth explaining his actions. It was not to be delivered to her until after he had gone. He explained that he was leaving the country for the safety of his soul and the service of God, but he was still loyal to the Queen and had affection for her. But he was betrayed by one of his servants. He was arrested at sea off Littlehampton and brought back to London and imprisoned in the Tower. Severely beaten he was accused of treason for working with Mary, Queen of Scots. Many of his relatives, friends and servants were also imprisoned. Under guise of new evidence that had allegedly come to light, he was imprisoned at the Queen's pleasure and fined the massive sum of ten thousand pounds. In 1589 he was sentenced to death. He valiantly defended himself: 'For the discharge of my conscience before God I, here protest before His Divine Majesty and all the Holy Court of Heaven, that I have committed no treason and that the Catholic and Roman faith, which I hold is the only cause (so far as I can in any way imagine) why either I have been thus long imprisoned and for which I am now ready to be executed'. However, Philip was not executed. He was left to die a very long and lingering death for a further ten years. In this time he led a devout life of regular prayer and he penned several religious works which were printed after his death. He fasted on bread and water for three days every week as penance for the way he had treated his wife before his conversion. His final wish was to see his wife and children. Their only son, Thomas, had been born just after Philip's imprisonment. This was denied him - unless he would conform and then he would be set free. Refusing to compromise he died at the age of 38 on 19th October 1595. He was buried in the Tower and was finally interred in the shrine in Arundel Cathedral in 1971. He was a true hero and Anne, his wife, was a true heroine.
