Father Liam says: The only Carthusian monastery in England is in our diocese – near Henfield. They are a particularly austere community and at the time of the Reformation there were a number of Carthusian houses in this country. The first martyrs of the Tudor persecution were Carthusians. King Henry VIII declared it to be high treason to deny that the Monarch was the supreme head of the church in England. The Act of Supremacy came into force on 1st February 1535 and the King knew that the Carthusians would refuse to take the oath so he intended to make an example of them to the rest of the nation.

John Houghton was the Prior of the London Charterhouse of the community and he warned them that they would be faced with the alternative between apostacy and martyrdom. In February 1535 the Priors of two of the houses visited the London Charterhouse to consult with Prior Houghton about the impending situation. The house at Sheen had been founded in 1414 and had become the largest of the nine Charterhouses in England. These three priors decided to meet Thomas Cromwell, the King's chief secretary but he committed all three to the Tower.

Royal Commissioners interrogated them about the Oath and took down their answers, which are still preserved in the Public Records Office. Robert Lawrence, who was Prior of the house in Nottinghamshire, 'says that there is one Catholic Church of which the Bishop of Rome is the head. Therefore, he cannot believe that the King is the Supreme head of the Church'. Augustine Webster, Prior of the home in Lincolnshire, 'says that he cannot take the King to be Supreme head of the Church, but him that is by the Doctors of the Church taken as head of the Church, that is the Bishop of Rome, as Ambrose, Jerome, Augustine affirm'. A few days later they were arraigned in Westminster Hall on a charge of treason for saying that 'The King is not Supreme head on earth of the church in England'. At first the jury refused to bring in the required verdict but on the following day Cromwell terrorized them into submission and sentence of death was passed.

On 4th May, as they were tied to the hurdles, St Thomas More, also a prisoner in the Tower, saw them from his window. He turned to his daughter Margaret who was visiting him and said: 'Lo, dost thou not see, Meg, that these blessed Fathers be going to their deaths as cheerfully as a bridegrooms to their marriage'. Wearing their habits (a thing, hitherto, unheard of in a Christian country) they were drawn through the mud and dirt of Newgate Street and Holborn. At Tyburn the other two had to look on at the butchery of John Houghton, who embraced his executioner and freely forgave him for what he was about to do. As he stood in the cart with a rope around his neck he spoke to the crowd: 'I call almighty God to witness and I beseech all here present to attest for me on the dreadful day of judgement, that being about to die in public I declare that I have refused to comply with the will of His Majesty, the King, not from obstinacy, malice or a rebellious spirit, but solely for fear of offending the Supreme Majesty of God. Pray for me and have pity on my brethren of whom I have been an unworthy Prior.' They used a specially thick rope for fear he might die before the butchery began. When the rope was cut, they tore off his habit and the ghastly dismemberment began.

Each of the other Priors, as they entered the cart were offered a free pardon if they would renounce the authority of the Pope. They too preferred death to apostacy, so their bodies also were beheaded and divided into four parts.
